

BUSY TIMES AT THE STATE FAIR TRACK.

Horsemen Had to go Some at Agricultural Park Yesterday And Today.

EDWARDS CHOSEN STARTER.

Big Match Race of Elks Day Between Joe McGregor, Angie Duryea And June Wilkes.

One week from today, July 24th.

Then will be heard the glad cry: "They are off!"

Then the horsemen will be in their glory; turf patrons hereabouts will be made glad, and Manager W. S. Jones will see the beginning of the end of the many troubles he has had for weeks past.

From Monday until Saturday, inclusive, it will be running, trotting and pacing with many amusing features added especially on Elks day, which is the 27th.

If one cares to gather a few ideas of what the big meet will be, just go down to Agricultural park and take a seat in the grand stand and watch the points work out. They were there today and will be there every day. Manager Jones is elated with the showing made thus far, and declares he now has no fear that his promise to pull off the best race ever here, will not be fulfilled. There are over 50 fast trotters, pacers and runners now stabled at the track, jockeys and trainers and owners are here by the dozens.

Some of the stars of the Western circuit are still at Colorado Springs, and will come to arrive here Thursday and Friday.

Manager Jones is in receipt of a telegram from J. B. Loomis of Denver that the latter will bring here the great mare Martha B. This animal won the 2 1/2 mile at Denver, making the time of 2:05.

It has been agreed that the proposed three-day race between Angie Duryea, Joe McGregor and June Wilkes, shall take place on the 27th. The purse is added, \$500 and there is a side bet also.

This should prove one of the star events of the meet, if indeed, not the feature.

Horsemen generally are pleased with the selection of the well known expert George Edwards for official starter. Mr. Edwards is the man who will start the animals off, both in the harness and running events. A more capable man would be pretty hard to find.

Among the jockeys who are now on the scene are Charles Lee, Ivers, Johnson, McRae, Gross, Doc Turberville, Shackelton, Dickey and others. It will take up too much space to give at this time a list of names of the fast horses now quartered at the track. The list includes some of the speediest animals following the circuit.

ATHLETICS AT FAIR.

Swimming contests is next event on list—Tennis Games.

Portland, Or., July 16.—Some of the best swimmers in the United States, most of them entering under the colors of California clubs, will compete in the Louis & Clark swimming and diving contests, which are to be held during the present week.

Scott Leary and P. Gailley, two well known swimmers, who took part in the contests at St. Louis last year, are entered by the Olympic club of San Francisco. An eastern candidate for honors is H. J. Handorf of the Central Y. M. C. A., Chicago. Handorf is recognized as one of the fastest swimmers in the world and unless the long journey from Chicago and the change of climate affect him he will prove a formidable antagonist.

In the diving championship the contest will be restricted to a plunge for distance. In this event the contestants are John W. Moore of Los Angeles and Sydney Cavill of the Olympic club. Blase has competed in diving contests all over the world. His club has made in various countries. Cavill held the diving championship of Australia before coming to this country and has a fine record in Europe.

PARK CITY TEAM DEFEATED EUREKA.

Largest Crowd of Season Saw Mining Camp Teams Fight It Out.

GAME WON IN THE TENTH.

Result Might Have Been Different Had Not Pitcher Thornton Weakened in the Last Inning.

It is estimated that fully 2,000 baseball fans, the largest crowd ever seen on the Eureka diamond, assembled there yesterday and saw the Park City team defeat the Eureka champions by a score of 11 to 6 in a ten inning struggle.

The Parkites went to Eureka in a special train, accompanied by a brass band, and about 200 loyal rovers. They were full of confidence and determined to win. In addition to the Park City rovers, there were at least 100 fans from other towns.

The visiting ball artists and their friends, were met at the depot by a delegation and the Union brass band. The party was escorted to the Elks hall where they were royally entertained.

The game was called at 3:30 p. m. Both teams started to do business in the first inning. For Park City, Bradley struck out one and Beck caught a fly. Lumley, a Eureka player, stung out a three-bagger and scored on a safe one by Wall. The latter was brought in on a hit by Beck.

An error by King let Marx get third. It looked like a score but Thornton struck out one and Beck caught a fly. There was nothing doing until the third inning when the Eureka team made a score on a hit and an error. Hahn then brought in another on an error by Butler.

Park City began doing things in the fourth. Marx struck one out good for three runs and brought in an error. An error by Sullivan to Miller's field next Sunday for a side bet of \$25, and another game at Walker's on the 24th. The detailed score follows:
