LOCAL SUGAR CO.'S ARE NOT AFFECTED

Eastern Railways Announce Retaliatory Policy in Dealing With Southern Lines.

At the offices of the several sugar companies in Salt Lake, Ogden and Logan, in answer to inquiries made by The Desert News, it is given out that the agitation among the eastern railroads on the question of freight rates on sugar, will have no effect on the local factories. Joseph Geoghegan, the broker who handles the output of the Utah-Idaho, Amalgamated and the Lewiston companies, pointed-out the article published in a morning newspaper which states that the sugar beet interests will be affected by the proposed changes. Mr. Geoghegan tersely said that the market for practically all the sugar shipped from Utah and Idaho to the east, is found around Missouri river points, almost entirely west of the Mississippi. Very little sugar went east of the Mississippi and none at all to Cleveland.

In the remote event that the eastern railroads did reduce the rate on sugar to the Missouri river points, the western railroads would simply make a rate to compete it, as the latter, of course, would not see this extensive business injured.

It is not unlikely that the proposed change will affect the shipment of Colorado sugar to the east, as a large part of it is sold as far eastward as Pittsburgh and Buffalo.

The larger eastern roads have announced that, effective Nov. 27, freight rates on sugar will be reduced from New York and Philadelphia to Cleveland and other western cities to meet the reductions which have been announced by the lines from New Orleans northward, and which go into effect on the 27th inst.

A circular issued from New York states the situation as follows: "An important meeting of the trunk line railroads will decide whether or not the sugar rate war, which has been going on since the Central Freight association, or carried further west and right into the territory now covered by the Illinois Central, at least one of the eastern roads, it is said, and the one that occupies a leading position in the association, is in favor of such aggressive action. It is taken the ground that the quickest way to show the offending roads that the eastern lines will not submit to the adoption of retaliatory measures."

"The decision made to meet the New Orleans rates into the C. F. A. was considered at the time entirely sufficient, but further action has been decided upon. The Illinois Central, at least one of the eastern roads, it is said, and the one that occupies a leading position in the association, is in favor of such aggressive action. It is taken the ground that the quickest way to show the offending roads that the eastern lines will not submit to the adoption of retaliatory measures."

"The new tariff adopted then, to go into force on Nov. 27, would have been in force in Washington to take effect at that time, according to the rules of the interstate commerce commission, which require a notice of 30 days. In their place a new tariff will, no doubt, be framed at the meeting tomorrow, and will be in force within a short time."

"The New Orleans tariff has been filed in Washington with the interstate commerce commission to become effective Nov. 27. It affects about 100 points, all in Ohio or Indiana, except Detroit. The rate to all from New Orleans and Port Chalmers, is 25 cents, a cut of 4 cents."
