Speaking of the *furor* about Dickens  
in New York the *Times* says: We have  
all heard of ten or twenty dollars being  
offered for tickets; but it is a literal fact  
that five dollars were frequently offered  
after 7 o'clock for places in the line—for  
the privilege of waiting two or three  
hours for a ticket. The spectacle is  
worthy of record.

Ohio was, by the census of 1860, the  
third State of the Union, having a pop-  
ulation of 2,339,501, or 7.44 per cent.  
of the whole. The State now gives more  
attention to the production of wool,  
having the largest number of sheep of  
any State—viz: 6,568,052, out of 32,695,-  
797 in the United States. The livestock  
in the State was valued, in 1866, at \$151,-  
000,000, which exceeds that of any State  
except New York, being \$170,552,506.

At a large dinner party lately the cool  
weather had done considerable duty in  
supplying the conversation, when a  
plump, happy looking married lady  
made a remark about cold feet. "Sure-  
ly," said a lady opposite, "Mrs. —,  
you are not troubled with cold feet?"  
Amidst an awful pause she naively an-

The Zoological Gardens which are  
projected for the Central Park in New  
York will, when completed, embrace  
the largest zoological collection in the  
world. The array of animals at present  
on exhibition, which form the nucleus  
of the grand project, is either confined  
to the arsenal or scattered through the  
grounds. The plot selected for the gar-  
dens is situated on Eighth avenue, and  
is bounded by Ninth avenue, Seventy-  
seventh and Eighty-first streets. Ani-  
mals from every quarter of the globe  
will be domiciled in the building. The  
temperature of the air will be graduated  
to the natural climate whence they  
come, whether from the frigid or the  
torrid zones, and native keepers, ac-  
quainted with their disposition and  
wants, will be selected for them.

Mr. Dellisier, a French savant, it is  
stated, actually predicted the earth-  
quake and hurricane at St. Thomas and  
other parts of the West Indies. He gave  
the date—the 12th of November—and it  
was on the night of the 11th that the  
convulsions of nature commenced or  
were preceded by a "terrible display of  
electrical light." From that time to  
the 19th Jamaica, St. Thomas and a large  
portion of the West Indies were in a  
fearfully convulsed state. Mr. Dellisier,  
it is said, made his calculations from as-  
tronomical observations, and from the  
influence of planets on the surface of the  
earth. It is reported he is preparing a  
work on the subject, to be read to the  
Academy of Sciences at Paris.—Ex.
