

## SAVED THEIR LIVES BY FLIGHT

Telegram Ordering Arrest and Execution of Enemies of Hayti Suppressed.

### FRIENDS HAD WARNED THEM

When Message Was Delivered Vessel On Which They Flew Had Sailed an Hour Before.

New York, July 11.—By the suppression of a telegram ordering the arrest and immediate death of enemies of the government of Hayti, and with only one hour to spare, two merchants of Port au Prince saved their lives by flight and are now in New York on their way to Curaçao. They are Adair Valbrune and Dantes Theodule, both of whom arrived here on the Prinz Wilhelm IV of the Royal Dutch West India mail service.

Through the influence of friends the men learned on July 4 that an order for their arrest had been issued. The telegram received at Port au Prince was said to have borne the name of Nord Alexis, president of Hayti, and to have read in part:

"Take the men from their beds and shoot them at once."

Valbrune and Theodule stood high in Haytian circles and had many friends in the service of the government. Realizing that immediate action was imperative, they conferred with officials who were friendly and arranged to have the telegram held in the receiving office at Port au Prince until 2 o'clock in the afternoon of July 4. The Prinz Wilhelm IV was scheduled to steam for New York at 6 o'clock.

The two condemned men gathered together a few pieces of baggage and went aboard the vessel.

When the telegram was delivered the Prinz Wilhelm IV had steamed an hour before and the refugees were beyond the jurisdiction of Haytian law.

As soon as the vessel docked in Brooklyn Valbrune and Theodule were hurried away by a friend, who secreted them until passage could be arranged on the Maracabo, which steams for Curaçao at noon today.

### CONGRESSMAN LEAKE WILL SUPPORT TAFT

New York, July 10.—Eugene W. Leake, Democrat, member of Congress for the Ninth district of New Jersey, wrote today to William H. Taft announcing that he will vote for Taft and offering his services to the Republican nominees during the campaign. Mr. Leake's letter follows:

"Jersey City, July 10, '08. Hon. William H. Taft, Hot Springs, Va. My dear Mr. Taft—I cannot subscribe either to the candidate or the platform of the Democratic convention. The conservative citizens of this country, who are neither reactionary nor the representatives of predatory wealth or special interests, but who desire a rigid enforcement of the law, with equal justice, must look to you for protection against the wave of radicalism and class prejudice which will follow the Denver convention. You will have my vote on election day, and if during the campaign, my services will be of any value to your national committee, I will cheerfully tender them.

"Very respectfully yours, 'EUGENE W. LEAKE.' Mr. Leake is serving his first term in Congress. He was recently defeated for re-election, which he may have something to do with his change of heart.

### STEVE ADAMS CASE.

Rejection of His Confession as Evidence Causes Prosecution to Close.

Grand Jurors, Colo., July 10.—The decision of Judge Shafter, before whom Steve Adams is being tried on the charge of murdering Arthur Collins that the document purporting to be a confession of the crime made and signed by Adams while he was confined in prison in Idaho, was not admissible as evidence in the hearing here, materially changed the plans of the prosecution, and only two witnesses were placed on the stand today.

One of these witnesses was Bulkeley Wells, former adjutant general of Colorado, who brought Adams to Colorado. He testified that on the way hither

He said that Warden Mills of the Idaho penitentiary was the other witness. He told of Adams' confinement in prison under his charge and verified the statements of Bulkeley Wells concerning several visits to Adams while in prison.

When the state announced that it rested, the defense asked for adjournment until tomorrow. ### FORESTRY SERVICE.

During the Fall Months it Will be Completely Reorganized.

Washington, D. C., July 10.—During the fall months the forestry service is to be completely reorganized and one-half the clerks will be sent west, to be distributed between six cities chosen for administrative headquarters. At each of these places from 40 to 50 clerks will be located, under a many administrative heads, and will handle purely administrative forestry matters that are now handled in Washington. These branch offices will be located at Salt Lake, Denver, Missoula, Albuquerque, Portland and San Francisco.

This change is made to permit disposition of all administrative matters in the locality where they arise and to avoid delays incident to the transmission of papers to Washington and return, as at present.

No new appointments will be made and the clerks assigned to the western offices will all be sent from Washington, where they are now employed.

## GREAT LAKE OF OIL ON FIRE

Area is More Than a Mile Square And is of Unknown Depth.

### HAS BEEN BURNING FOR DAYS

Is in State of Vera Cruz, Mexico, and Blaze Can Be Seen for Hundreds of Miles at Sea.

Chicago, July 11.—A dispatch to the Tribune from the City of Mexico says: A lake of oil covering an area of more than one square mile and of unknown depth in the state of Vera Cruz is on fire. It has been burning for five days and has created the wildest terror among the natives of that section. The blaze is seen for more than 200 miles at sea, according to navigators who have arrived at Vera Cruz and Tampico.

The scene of the fire is about 75 miles southeast of Tampico near the San Geronimo river. It is remote from any railroad. An oil field was being developed at that place by the Pennsylvania oil company, which is composed of Pittsburgh men. The company had bored a number of wells and all of them were flowing oil in large quantities. The product was being placed in earthen storage tanks preparatory to shipping.

A careless workman accidentally set fire to one of the wells and the flames were communicated to the underground reservoir of oil. A terrific explosion occurred which lifted the earth's surface throughout the whole field. The explosion was heard 75 miles distant. The oil company lost \$200,000 worth of machinery and the oil which has been burned will total millions of barrels. The whole oil field will be destroyed.

## PROVISION OF CLEVELAND'S WILL

Trenton, N. J., July 10.—The will of former President Grover Cleveland was probated today. It is in Mr. Cleveland's own handwriting and makes no disclosures as to the extent of his wealth. After some minor bequests and the creation of a fund of \$10,000 for each of the four children, the remainder is left to Mrs. Cleveland. In the will Mr. Cleveland expresses the desire that he be buried in the place where he died, and that his body be not removed unless it should be absolutely necessary to have it removed by the side of his wife's body. Mrs. Cleveland is made executrix and Frank S. Hastings executor under the will.

The text of the will is as follows: "I, Grover Cleveland, of the borough of Princeton, in the state of New Jersey, do make, publish and declare this my last will and testament hereby expressly revoking all previous wills by me made.

"First—I hereby direct that, after payment of all my debts and funeral expenses, an appropriate monument with brief inscription and only moderately expensive be erected at my grave and paid for out of my estate. I desire to be buried wherever I may reside at the time of my death and that my body shall always remain where it shall be at first buried, subject to its removal only if it shall be absolutely necessary in order that it shall repose by the side of my wife and in accordance with her desire.

"Second—I give to my niece, Mary Hastings, daughter of my sister, Anna Hastings, the sum of \$3,000, to be paid to her as soon as practicable after my death.

"Third—I give to my friend, Richard Watson Gilder, the watch given to me in 1882 by the said Gilder and E. C. Benedict and J. J. Sinclair, and also the chain attached to the same when last worn by me.

"Fourth—I give to each of the four daughters of my nephew, Richard Hastings, now or lately living with my sister, Anna Hastings, the sum of \$2,000 each.

"Fifth—I give to Frank S. Hastings, my good friend and executor of this will, as the most personal memento I can leave to him, the seal ring I have worn for many years, which was given to me by my dear wife, and with whose hearty concurrence this gift is made.

"Sixth—I give to my two daughters, Esther and Marion, and to my two sons, Richard F. and Francis G., the sum of \$10,000 each, to be paid to them respectively as they shall arrive at the age of 21 years.

"Until these legacies are paid or shall lapse they shall be kept invested and the income derived therefrom shall be paid to my wife and the aggregate of said income shall be applied by her to the support, maintenance and education of said children in such manner and in such proportions as she shall deem best without any liability to any of said children on account thereof.

If, however, either of my said daughters shall before her legacy becomes payable, cease for any reason to reside with her mother, from that time the income arising from the investment of her legacy shall be paid to said daughter. In case either of my said children shall die before his or her legacy shall actually be paid, leaving a child or children, then such legacy shall be paid to such child or children, but otherwise the said legacy shall lapse and become a part of the residuary estate disposed of by this instrument.

"Seventh—All the rest and residue of my estate and property of which I may be seized or possessed, of every kind and nature, wheresoever the same may be situated, I give, devise and bequeath to my dear wife, Frances F. Cleveland and to her heirs and assigns forever, and I hereby appoint her guardian of all my children during their minority.

"Eighth—I hereby appoint my wife, Frances F. Cleveland, executrix, and Frances F. Cleveland, executrix, and last will and testament.

Witness my hand and seal, at Princeton, New Jersey, this 31st day of February, one thousand nine hundred and six (1906).

I, of course, appreciate the honor conferred on Mr. Kern, but I cannot understand what would cause him to accept the nomination. Mr. Kern has a healthy body, but in past campaigns by his activity, and as he means vastly more to me than any political honor, I am sincerely sorry, although I suppose I should not say so."

## INDEPENDENCE PARTY LEADERS

### WILL PUT TICKET IN FIELD

Will Endeavor to Have One in Every State in the Union—Strong Sentiment for Hise for President.

New York, July 11.—Preparations are well under way for the national convention of the Independence party, which will be held at Chicago Monday, July 27. While the eyes of most politicians have been centered upon the Democratic national convention hall in Denver these last few days, Independence party leaders have been completing their plans for the Chicago convention and with the return from Europe of William R. Hearst next week, all will be ready.

The Independence party leaders say they will put a full ticket in the field and will also try to have a state ticket in every state in the Union. In 28 states national committees of the Independence party have been appointed, and with the return from Europe of William R. Hearst next week, all will be ready.

Although the party leaders have not come out strong as yet for any one man as their standard bearer in the campaign, there is a strong sentiment they say for Thomas L. Hise, of West Springfield, Mass. Mr. Hise ran for governor of Massachusetts two years ago on the Hearst ticket and polled a surprisingly large vote. This was encouraging to the Independence party leaders. Another possible candidate is H. W. Howard of Alabama, a member of the national committee of the Independence party from Alabama. He is a former congressman.

The Independence party leaders here say that the strength of the party has grown in the south remarkably of late, and they expect it to keep on growing from now until the day of election. The party leaders say they do not expect to win this fall, but seek to bring the party and its principles before the people to open the way for future growth.
