

A "LIBERAL" PROPOSITION.

One of the plained provisions of the Constitution is that, "The United States shall guarantee to every State in the Union a republican form of government." Territories, although not independent commonwealths, are incipient States and the provision applies to them in degree. Any form of government with the United States which is not republican in its nature is contrary to the Constitution, and to the whole genius of American institutions. The territorial form of government is an anomaly in our national system, and is a great stretch of the powers conferred upon Congress and the Executive. But it has some features of a republican form of government, chief of which is the popular Legislature, elected by the citizens and endowed with power over "all rightful subjects of legislation," subject to the revision of Congress.

But what can be thought of a proposition to take away from Utah that feature which is the main token that the Territory is not a strappy, a subject province of a monarchial government? Yet this is one of the aims of a party which ironically calls itself "Liberal." The platform adopted at the "Liberal" Convention was simply the Address re-echoed and spoiled by a redundancy of words—had this one new feature taken to it:

"We affirm the conviction that the true and only remedy for the evils we have communicated lies in a re-echo of the legislative power now possessed by the Utah Legislative Assembly, and in transmitting it to a tribunal to be provided for by Congress and the Executive."

By the present measurably unrepudiated system, Utah is placed under a "one man power," in the shape of a Governor in whose appointment they have no voice; in the present instance a stranger to their people and their interests, ignorant of their needs and desires, hostile to their faith, and imbued with a bitterness toward them that is different from passion and vulgarity, and this official forced upon them by a negative veto upon the laws framed by their Legislature. Yet a small clique of the citizens, enraged because through the smallness of their numbers and the union of the masses which they impotently endeavor continually to break, desire to see the Territory deprived of the distinctive element of republican form of government left by Congress.

A band of monarchists could do to worse in this direction. But this clique calls itself the "Liberal" party. "Liberal" in what? In all alumnus and candor, we discover nothing liberal about them but liberality of falsehood and abuse. Ake notice, citizens of Utah, these are those who profess to work for progress wish to establish here one of the worst forms of colonial bondage, against which the fathers of our country arose in their might. The citizens here by its plan would be deprived of every vestige of a republican form of government, and the Territories would be in a far worse condition than any of the colonies of Old England. No nice whatever in the making of the was, no voice in any matter pertaining to their own political welfare. The Legislative, executive, judicial and all other departments under the sole control of the national government, the heads of which are thousands of miles away. Do you want this respectable, peaceable, business-seeking but not office-seeking, "Mormonism"? Would this suit you any more than it would the most devoted Latter-day Saint? We think not. We have no idea that the honorable "Gentiles," of whom Utah has always had a few, endorse any of the movements of the rest of the disculant and live-lived cabal, much more than they endorse the material progress of the Territory, and if they do have any sympathy whatever with some of its clarations, they certainly will be disgusted with the paragraph which have quoted from its platform.

Of course we have not the slightest fear that such a proposition would meet with anything but contempt from Congress, or from any statesman with a head containing brains, but we place it before our readers for their consideration, so that all may see what is really meant by the nomination of a "Liberal" candidate for Delegate to Congress.

member, you that may feel inclined to vote for an opposition candidate, "just for the fun" of it, that a vote for a person proposing such work for the platform containing at infamous proposition. You do not want to aid in trying to do with popular rights in Utah; inaugurate a despotism stronger in anything which these "Liberal" falsely pretend to exercise here the priesthood. You throw your influence on the side of anti-republicanism. You join in an unconstitutional scheme. You try to force sin for your own limbs and make iron yoke for your own necks, as well as for the "Mormons."

It appears to us that the fair-minded portion of the non-"Mormons" of Utah ought to signify that they have had enough of such foolery and lacy, by at least quietly rejecting the schemes of the "Liberal" "one-man power" scheme, and by refusing to vote for a candidate representing such vile elements as that which we have described from the platform. If you wish to act politically against the People's Party, all right. Let us do it, asseably and decently, for their own "Mormon" sake, and for the sake of decency and respectability of the Republic, or Democratic consistency, you should keep aloof by vote and

presence from the backguard, ribald and slanderous band, among whom our poor, soft Governor seems to take so much delight and with whom he elegantly threatens to "make Rome howl."

And you, old settlers of Utah and members of the People's party, pay particular attention to this proposition of the "Liberal" who are trying to capture your sons, and let everybody understand it, "according to the spirit and meaning thereof." It is enough to sink to everlasting perdition any party which creates or endorses it, and place its originators beneath common contempt.

A SPECIMEN "LIBERAL" INACCURACY.

DURING a speech at a recent "Liberal" meeting in this city, Gen. P. E. Connor made the sweeping statement, the truth of which he asserted from his own knowledge, that through the negligence or wilful partiality of the "Mormon" Assessor, in his position as Register, nine-tenths of the "Gentile" voters of Tooele County had been practically disfranchised, their names not being placed on the Registry List. So much for the statement. Now as to the facts.

It appears that the Tooele County Register appointed "Gentile" deputies in those precincts containing the bulk of the voters of the "Liberal" party, for the very purpose of avoiding even an appearance of unfairness. Stockton precinct includes Rush Lake, Ophir precinct includes Jacobs City, and these places contain the mining population of Tooele County. "Gentile" deputy Registers attended to the registration in those places. If any "Liberal," then, was practically disfranchised through non-registration, it certainly was not because of any "Mormon" wilfulness or neglect.

We learn that the "Mormon" Register went further, and stretched a point in favor of the "Liberal," by allowing these deputies to act in these precincts under the provision of the law which permits voters who have not been registered, to appear at his office during the second week in September of every other year and have the list corrected. The deputies attended to this in the precincts, by which this 56 names were added to the list in the Stockton precinct, but it was also discovered that of the 105 voters whose names were on the list at the August election, at least half have moved away; so that the vote from this precinct next November will not be any larger than in last August. The works at Ophir and Jacobs City are idle, and the men have moved, so that the other "Liberal" precinct is also largely denuded of its voters. Therefore, if the "Liberal" vote in Tooele County is small in November, it will be through no wrong on the part of the "Mormon" Assessor and Register.

We allude to this matter because it is a fair sample of "Liberal" accuracy. There is another thing connected with this that we wish to notice. We are reliably informed that at the August election, General Connor grumbled considerably at Stockton, because he could not vote after being, as he said, a resident of Utah for sixteen years; inferring that there was something terribly despotism in the way political affairs are conducted in Utah. But at the meeting, when he made his speech in this city, he admitted that he was a resident of Nevada. This is "Liberalism" with a vengeance! A citizen of Nevada talks about "priestly despotism" because he is not allowed to vote in Utah! It is significant of the whole "Liberal" movement, which means nothing less than liberty, or license, to do just as its supporters please, regardless of laws, regulations, the rights of the majority or any legitimate authority in heaven above or the earth beneath.

The wild and baseless statements of those reckless persons have been permitted so long to go unanswered and unnoticed from the body of the people here, that they feel safe in saying anything, no matter how ridiculous or unfounded, so long as it is a reflection on the "Mormons" and their leading men. But it will perhaps make them a trifle more cautious, if, as in this case, their broad and inexcusable perversions are exhibited in their true character.

THE GRAND RATIFICATION.

The Union Permanent, and New York's Vote Assured to Hancock, NEW YORK, 23.—The great democratic union mass meeting last night was perhaps the most important political demonstration that has ever taken place in that city. Union Square, adjoining streets and avenues were literally jammed with people and all about was brilliantly illuminated. The principal meeting was in Tammany Hall which was packed with the crowd from all audiences. John Kelly called this meeting to order and was greeted with uproarious applause. He introduced Daniel Dougherty of Philadelphia who made an eloquent opening address. Irving Hall was not less crowded than Tammany Hall and the enthusiasm was just as wild. John McKean presided and read the following dispatch from H. M. Plaisied, of Maine:

Thanks for your invitation to be present at your ratification meeting over the victory of our plain people who believe our government established to protect labor, should confine itself to equal protection, equal benefits, equal privileges and equal rights upon all, high and low, rich and poor to the end that it may ever result in the interest of all and in the love of all. Our victory will not be counted out. It has come to stay. (Signed) H. M. PLAISIED, Bangor.

Representative Wardell, of North Carolina and others made speeches. Senator Wallace, of Pennsylvania, was presented to the crowd from a platform in the open air, and excused himself from speaking in consequence of a sore throat. Senator Francis Kernan, of New York, followed by other speakers. The speakers of the United States had a deeper interest in the character of the men to be selected at the next election to make laws, or the character

of the man to be selected as President of the United States than the people dwelling in this city. They were interested because they desire to do business with every State in the Union. Dear Sir—Though it will not be practicable for me to avail myself of your invitation to attend the meeting to be held on the 22nd inst. in support of Hancock and English, I most cordially sympathize with its object; nor do I permit myself to doubt that the country is prepared to sustain all legitimate efforts to ensure a better administration of federal government.

Among the speakers was Wade Hampton, who made a speech of some length.

Canada Odd Fellows.

TORONTO, Canada, 24.—The Sovereign Grand Lodge of Odd Fellows yesterday elected L. J. Glim, of Atlanta, Ga., M. A. Grand Sire, and E. J. Leach, of Keokuk, Iowa, R. A. Deputy Grand Sire. The next meeting will be held at Cincinnati next year, when a monument will be dedicated in Old Fellows Cemetery. A grand concert was given at the Horticultural Gardens last night in honor of the Sovereign Grand Lodge, concluding with a display of fireworks. There was a large crowd present. The Bunker Hill, Boston regiment will visit in the morning, tomorrow, thence proceed home.

Canada Compulsory Land Bill.

CHICAGO, 24.—The Times Quebec special says: Just before the Confederation, the government of Prince Edward's Islands passed a compulsory land bill, which forced the land to sell, and then divided the domain into holdings of moderate size. The value of the lands was determined by arbitration. The government bought the land, gave the refusal of purchase, and allowed the greater part of the purchase money to remain on mortgage. A greater part of the land is now held in fee by the former tenants. Now comes the important news that Lord Kimberly, of the British Cabinet, calls on the Governor General of Canada for information as to the workings of the Prince Edward's Island compulsory land bill, and Lord is making inquiries of the Crown Land Commissioners. This is believed here to foretell action by Gladstone's Government as to Ireland.

Increase of Democratic Congressmen.

The Times Columbus special says: The Ohio State Journal with this morning announce that the present object of the democrats is to increase the alleged democratic representation in Congress from Ohio and Indiana. To secure that result, not less than \$500,000 have been remitted from Great Britain within the last 20 days, and as much more will be forthcoming, if necessary, to overcome the republican majority in the districts regarded as doubtful.

Family Quarrel in the Spanish Royal Household.

The Herald's Paris special says: The Madrid correspondent of the Herald telegraphs as follows: When Queen Isabella came to Madrid it was rumored that she would return to Paris immediately upon the death of Queen Christina. Her prolonged stay causes much comment, and it is remarked that she shows a particular regard on the one hand to Marshals Cambo, Cobchi and General Prendergast, and other chiefs of the dynastic liberal opposition, whose ladies crowd her salons, and that on the other all her old servants in the aristocracy and the army now flock to the palace as they have never done since the restoration. What will drive her son to witness blood fights on his lands, even the lower classes cheer her. Some say she does all this to spite her successor, but the real object of Isabella's prolonged stay is that she is pressing her long standing claims on the treasury, and the cabinet is in a fix. She is entitled to over one million dollars in capital, besides years of accumulated interest on old arrears due her on her civil list and on the pension left her by her father, Ferdinand VII. She does not press her claims very vigorously, knowing the embarrassment of the treasury. She only seeks their recognition and annual payment. This, lawyers say, the government cannot refuse. Still it is easy for the Cabinet to ask the Cortes to agree to her demands and add a new burden to the estimates that have closed every year since the restoration with deficits, that range from twenty-six million dollars to twenty-nine million dollars. Queen Isabella has rejected Senor Conovas's suggestion to come and live in the palace, with the princess Isabella and two young infants, and thus reduce her expenses. Senor Conovas insisted as a preliminary condition on the Queen dismissing all her present entourage, and forming her household of government nominees. There have been some very hot family discussions at the palace, and the Queen is said to have spoken her minds with unusual freedom. The result is that Queen Isabella returns to Paris and maintains all her claims.

Political.

The Times says: Byfield and Peete, the democratic and republican candidates for congressmen in the Indianapolis district have arranged for a joint debate. Delany, greenbacker, asked that the discussion be made three-cornered, but the others refused. He now threatens to follow them up and speak to their audience on his own responsibility after they have finished. The straight greenbackers in Maine headed by Senor Conovas claim that democratic emissaries are in the row in endeavoring to break their ranks by an unlimited amount of money in the interest of the fusionists;

South American News.

PANAMA, 18.—The Peruvians are actively engaged in drilling and organizing their army for the protection of Lima and in fortifying the city. Even the Chinese are joining in the universal enthusiasm and a nucleus of the celestial guard has already been formed of six of the richest Chinamen in the capital, and a corps of some 600 men of the best Chinese society is offered in mission of Christianity. American Minister to Peru, to the south turns out now not to be one of peace, but of the putting of present conditions to a test. Chile for damage caused to American property during the war. At Valparaiso, August 18, an steamer with mail was leaving port, a severe storm of rain and wind was experienced, which is supposed to have caused considerable damage. It was reported at Louima, that the ship in a hundred had been destroyed by the shock and some 200 people dwelling in this city. They were again bombarded Calloa on August 31.

Haley, the New York piano manufacturer, has with his friends bought a controlling interest in the Robertson Electric Ore Reducing Company.

Geochan, British Ambassador to Constantinople, has officially informed the Porte of the presentation of Vice-Admiral Seymour's ultimatum to Riza Pasha.

The body of Peter Woodland the foreman who perished with nine others, when the Hudson River tunnel caved in, was recovered from the caisson last night.

Master in Chancery Williams, of New York, has advertised the sale of the Stevens Battery for Wednesday the 29th. The Stevens Battery is a "big elephant" on the hands of the State of New Jersey.

A committee of the United States International Wool Growers Association reported in favor of calling the attention of Congress to the necessity of making a larger appropriation to the Department of Agriculture to assist in distributing documents regarding sheep and their product.
