

PRESIDENT WRITES TO THE GOVERNOR

Chief Executive Anticipates Support in Utah in Resource Conservation.

DUTIES OF THE COMMISSION.

Newly Appointed Boards Will Have Much Work Ahead of Them to Carry Out Idea of Formation.

Gov. Cutler is in receipt of a letter from President Roosevelt, in which the appointment of the national conservation commission of the department of forests, of which Senator Reed Smoot is chairman, is announced. The president's letter is as follows:

"My Dear Governor: It gives me great pleasure to tell you that in accordance with the suggestion made by the governors at their conference at the White House in May, I have just appointed a national conservation commission to consider and advise me on questions relating to the conservation of the natural resources of the country, and to co-operate with similar bodies which may be designated by the several states. Enclosed is a copy of the letter of appointment, which includes a list of members of the commission. I hope for, and greatly count upon, the co-operation of yourself and your state to solve the fundamental and important problems involved. Sincerely yours, (Signed) THEODORE ROOSEVELT."

In the enclosed letter of appointment the president says of the recent conference:

"The recent conference of governors in the White House confirmed and strengthened in the minds of our people the conviction that our natural resources are being consumed, wasted and destroyed at a rate which threatens their permanent existence. It was demonstrated that the inevitable result of our present course towards these resources, if we should persist in following it, would ultimately be the impoverishment of the nation. The governors present adopted unanimously a declaration reciting the necessity for a more careful conservation of the foundations of our national prosperity, and recommending a more effective co-operation to this end among the states and between the states and the nation."

Of the work of the new commission the president says:

"The work of the commission should be conditioned upon keeping ever in mind the great fact that the life of the nation depends absolutely on the natural resources which have already made the nation great. Our object is to conserve the foundations of our prosperity. We intend to use these resources; but to so use them as to conserve them. No effort should be made to limit the wise and proper development and application of these resources; every effort should be made to prevent destruction, to reduce waste and to distribute the enjoyment of our natural wealth in such a way as to promote the greatest good of the greatest number for the longest time. That the interests of the state and nation are identical the president especially emphasizes. He further says:

"The recent conference of the governors of the states who are direct sponsors for the well being of the states, was notable in many respects; in none more than this, that the dignity, the autonomy, and yet the interdependence and mutual dependence of the several states were all emphasized and brought into clear relief, as rarely before in our history. There is no break between the interests of state and nation, these interests are essentially one. Hearty co-operation between the state and the national agencies is essential to the permanent welfare of the people."

Gov. Cutler will take into consideration suggestions in the letter and accompanying document and may sooner or later appoint a state commission to co-operate with the larger federal body.

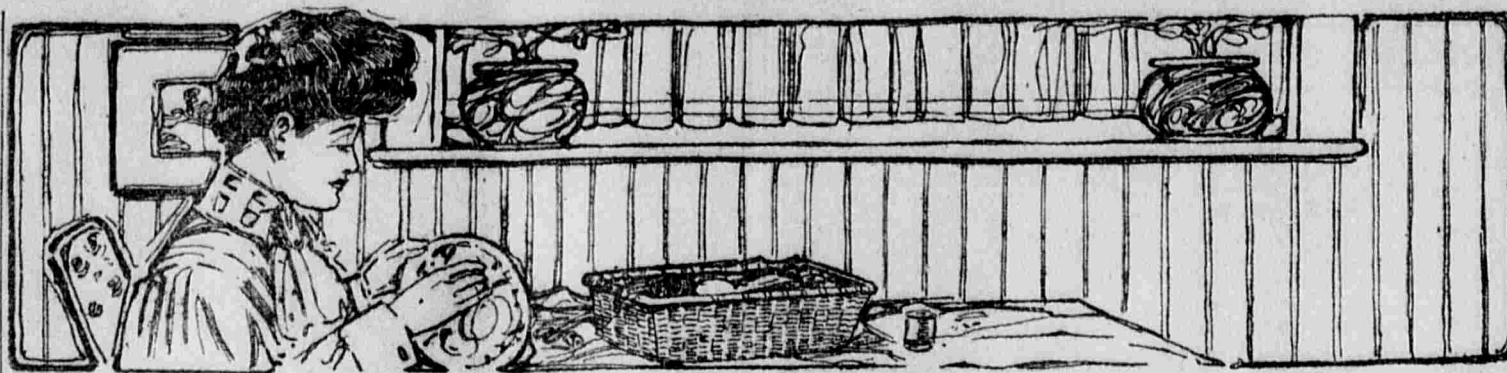
