The health of the people is good; the crope are abundant, but there is no market for grain, hence very little money is in circulation. Good schools are in operation in all the wards, but the Church schools are not so well attended as could be wished.

The following Bishops reported their wards, corroburating the statements of President Larsen: Peter Johnson, Huutington; Henning Olsen, Castle Dale; Frederick Olsen, Ferron; Wm. Lamph, Castle Gate; George France Lamph, Castle Gate; George Francsen, Price; E. D. Fulmer, Spring Gleo, and H. P. Kasmussen Moien.

Elder Lyman then addressed the conference ou punctuality and order in meetings. He said much contusion could be avoided by a proper arrange-ment of the seats before meeting. He explained the necessity of keeping ward records and of each person keep-

ing a diary.
In the afternoon, after the adminis tration of the Bacrament by the Priesthood of Cast.e Gate, Elder Lyman occupled the time in giving general counsel to the Saints. He thought it better to speak of the virtues of the people than of their vices. As a peo-ple we do not sin because we love wickedness but are always sorry when we make a false step. Church discip-line was explained by the speaker, Persons doing wrong in a strange ward should be dealt with in the ward where the acts were committed and then reported to their own ward.
