CITY RAILROAD

TO EXTEND LINE

Application Made to Council for a Franchise Over New Streets.

REFERRED TO COMMITTEES.

Proposition to Build on Thirtieth East, from Corner of First and Third Along Liberty Park South.

The Salt Lake City Railroad company, W. P. Head, superintendent, made application to the City Council last night for a franchise over the following streets:

From the intersection of N and Third streets along N street to the intersection of south Temple street, then along south Temple street to the south boundary of the city limits, also commencing at the intersection of Ninth and Twenty-ninth East street to the south boundary of the city.

According to the application was a proposal of \$10,000 to be expended, and a copy of the proposed resolution.

The amount of the franchise is estimated to be about \$10,000.

The proposition of resolution by order of Major Dell, each company commander was ordered to communicate his opinion.
