This requires nerve, frugality, industry and no little self-depial. Yet the practice of these virtues brings a great reward and insures independence.

There is no ward organiza tion at the present in Riverside, as expected that an organization will be perfected in the near future by the appointment of a Bishop. There are a There are a number of excellent people living in the region, and the next year will see a great obunge. A posteffice will be established after the let of Ja uary at the townsite, which is called Morejan; and as the stage passes there daily the people will have a daily mail.

There is a great change in the town of Blackfoot, which was once a radical arti-Mormon town, where no mercy was shown a Mormon, but where they are now welc me and acceptable neighbore, the oid-timers realizing that this industrious class brings prosperity.
