New York, May 15 .- Henry F. Devans, secretary of the National Trades association, has issued a lengthy statement setting forth the exact relation-ship existing between the National Trades association and the Internaional Association of Machinists. The

comet discovered at Queenstown, Australia, on April 24, was seen here last night. In the strong twilight no tail could be seen, only the head of the comet. Its position, observed by Mr. Aitken at 8 p. m., was right ascension 5 hours and 33 minutes, declination 3 legrees 37 minutes north. This is the first time the comet has been seen at any observatory in the northern hem-isphere. The comet is much fainter than when discovered and will not be visible here without a telescope.
