#### SECTION MAN'S PLEA.

Thinks Trackmen Should be Paid \$1.75 for a Day of Nine Hours.

Julius Lemperle, of 22 north East Temple street, writes to the "News" under the date of March 12, a plea for the humble section hand. He says in part

Prosperity has come again to this country; money is invested in almost every branch of industry; dividends have been much larger than in former years, but in some respects the labor ing man has not felt the increase in his wages to any appreciable extent. The railroad officials look upon the section and track men as if these tollers were not of any considerable account in the operation of a railroad when, in real-ity, they are the builders of the roads. Penholders, track inspectors and all those who command could do no good if they had not the section man to lay the foundation to such big enterprises. What can a man accomplish if he earns but \$1.50 a day by working ten hours, and on stormy days earns even les What about a family of several children; can they be raised properly on such wages, to say nothing of the time when the breadwinner is laid up with sickness?

"The trainmen and shop hands receive on an average of from \$60 to \$120 a month. The trackmen and section hands would be content, I think, with say, \$1.75 a day of nine hours. Publicity will help much to bring this present bad condition to a solution, as the public is essentially the supporter of the railroads. The section hand who works hard for his pittance has the right to live as anyone else. It would help everybody if one helps the other."
