CITY COUNCIL.

It was considerably after 8 o'clock July 16th when the adjourned session of the City Council was called to order by Mayor Scott. The members who responded to roll call were: Spafford, Karrick, Heath, Folland, Hyde, Hardy, Tuddenham, Young, Anderson, Lynn, Parsons and Pendleton.
Absent—Pickard, James and Smith.

PETITIONS.

F. T. Davidson asked for a position on the mounted police force. Referred to the Mayor.

H. E. Basford asked for an electric light two blocks west of present terminus, on Third North street. Committee on Improvements.

A. C. Summerville et al. asked for an electric light at intersection of Fourth West and Sixth South streets; also that a stagnant pool of water in front of African M. E. Church be filled. Committee on Improvements.

DuBois & Williams, the contractors for the Parley's Canyon conduit, asked that the time in which to complete their contract be extended sixty days. Board of public works.

J. M. Kennelly et al. asked for permission to lay cement walk on Second South, between Fourth and Fifth East streets. Board of public works.

Hobson & Wilkerson asked for an extension of sixty days in which to complete their contract on the conduit. Board of public works.

Mrs. Anna Monheim asked for permission to put a gate in Parley's canyon canal, to raise irrigating water to the surface of the ground. Committee on irrigation.

Andrew Glenn et al. asked that the board fence erected in front of the Kelsey & Gillespie building, at the corner of Second West and West Temple streets, be removed. Committee on streets.

John R. Winder, Jr., et al. asked that the grade of sidewalk on First South street, between Second and Third East streets, be not established as recently ordered. Committee on streets.

Benjamin Norwood asked to be allowed to erect and maintain a fruit stand at the corner of Second South and Fifth West streets. Committee on license.

Joseph E. Taylor asked to be allowed to pile building material on First South, between Second and Third East streets, for three months; also that the laying of the sidewalk in front of his property be delayed until after the completion of the building.

The first portion of the petition was granted with the usual restrictions; the latter part was referred to the Board of Public Works with power to act.

W. M. Williams asked to have his liquor license transferred to J. Wolf. Committee on license.

Luella C. Young et al. asked that the fence at corner of First South and Richards Avenue be removed. Board of Public Works.

J. S. Freebairn and 123 others asked for an extension of watermains on Seventh South to Levenick Avenue. Committee on waterworks.

J. S. Cameron asked for an extension of watermains along Seventh South street from the present terminus to Third West street. Granted.

Byrne and Bymer, lessees of the Warm Springs, asked permission to let the fence around that property for advertising purposes. Granted.

City Assessor and Collector Clute asked for an extension of two weeks time in which to file the assessment roll of 1891. Granted.

C. E. Stanton, county registrar, asked for an appropriation of \$94 for certified lists of registrations furnished the city for the recent school election. Granted.

E. C. Coffin and many others asked that the Rapid Transit company be allowed to put down another track on First street, from A to F street, and from H street to the reservation, in order to give adequate service. Committee on streets.

PRISONERS PARDONED.

Mayor Scott reported that he had pardoned the following city prisoners during the month of June: F. Delaney, Chas. Ward, Tracy Engram, Chas. Wingal, Chas. Scofield and John Green.

PERMISSION TO LAY SIDEWALKS.

The Board of Public works recommended that the petitions of the following persons for permission to lay sidewalks be granted: J. M. Bidwell and W. P. Lyon, Simon Bamberger, Louis Cohn, Charles Reed, A. Jenson, Sarah L. Siegel, George Dunford estate, A. Gebhardt, Commercial Block association, Commercial National bank, F. C. Gentsch, Western Hotel company, Presbyterian church, W. H. Sheermain, James Lowe, Margaret B. Salisbury. Adopted.

FROM THE CITY ATTORNEY.

City Attorney Hall reported an ordinance granting certain rights of way to the Rio Grande Western Railway Company and compiling and amending prior grants by the city to said corporation. Referred to the special committee on the Rio Grande Western Railway Company.

IRRIGATION COMMITTEE'S REPORT.

The committee on irrigation, to whom was referred the petition of P. L. Squires and others, representing that the waste waters from the tannery and woolen mills in Nineteenth ward were contaminated with poisonous dyes and other substances, reported that this statement was true, and the committee recommended that the companies be required to pipe their waste waters to the Eighth West street canal; also that the Rio Grande Western be instructed to place Sixth West street in good condition, and fix the excavation in that street so as to prevent lands from being flooded with water from the surplus canal.

The committee on irrigation, to whom was referred the matter of providing means for conveying irrigation water from street ditches to the abutting property within the sidewalk paving districts, recommended that

this provision be made at the expense of the property owners. Adopted.

FROM THE CITY RECORDER.

City Recorder Jack reported the completion of publication of water mains extension Nos. 100 to 105 inclusive. Confirmed.

STREET COMMITTEE'S REPORT.

The committee on streets reported as follows: In the matter of the petition of the proprietors of Poperton Place and Fort Douglas Rapid Transit company, asking for an electric street railway from the intersection of Fourth Street and Military reservation west to C street, thence south to the north line of South Temple street, and from intersection of Fourth and T street south line of First street, recommend that a franchise for a single track road be granted; that the petition of R. Lamph asking that Third North street from Fifth to Eighth West streets be granted. Referring to the communications of the city engineer, relative to grading those portions of the sidewalks outside of the pavement, we recommend that it be done under the same contract of grading the other portions of the walk; that the bill of the Stradamant Asphalt Company for laying walk on State street be paid; that the marshal be instructed to prevent the blocking of Fourth West street by the Union Pacific; that the crosswalks on the west side of the city on South Temple, and First and Second South streets running west of West Temple, be of stone blocks and flagging. For all other crosswalks within the districts improved they recommend that asphalt be used, all walks to correspond in width to the width of the sidewalks within that district, and that bids for the work be let at once. Adopted.

The same committee recommended that the side track laid by the Rapid Transit Company between Ninth South street and the city limits be approved. Adopted.

SIDEWALK RESOLUTIONS.

Councillman Folland offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That property owners desiring roadways to their place across sidewalks apply to the city engineer for estimates as to the cost of extra thickness for the same, the cost to be figured per ratio of the rate per square foot or yard of contract price, the property owner to pay the city assessor and collector this extra estimated cost; that the road may become part of and subject to all the agreements of contract with Salt Lake City.

The following substitute was introduced and adopted:

Resolved, That wherever, in any part of any sidewalk district, the permanent grade comes nearer the present contour of the ground rather than the temporary grade, the street committee with the city engineer associated are authorized to order the walk on the permanent grade.

Resolved, That all the intersections of all sidewalks shall be made of the same material as the walks approaching such intersection.
