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### New Treatment of Cancer.

New Treatment of Lincer. New York, Nov. 6.—A new treatment of cancer, which is believed to mark an important advance in the treatment of the dreaded growth has been ex-pathened before a meeting of the Aber-nathian society of St. Bartholomew's hospital by Dr. Johnson, who has been examining the methods employed by Dr. Otto Schmidt of Cologne, says a Herald dispatch from London. New York, Nov. 6.—Wildiam H. Thompson, a sea captain who has just committed suicide by drinking poison at his home near Bridgeport. Conn., as the result of domestic trouble was commodore of the White Star fleet of steamships 25 years ago, and at that time one of the best known and most popular sailing masters in the trans-Atlantic service. In 1872 when captain of the Brittanic, he was given a medal by Congress for saving 19 lives. In 1877, with the same ship, he made In 1877, with the same ship, he made the record for those days of a seven day voyage and was presented with a silver service by the passengers, among them were many promiuent whom were many prominent men. In 1961 he was arrested for forgery in connection with the affairs of Dr. W. C. Flower. The affair grew out of an issue of bonds. Thompson quit the sea 20 years ago.
