Honored Pioneer Answers Sudden Summons at 78.

Summons at 78. Special Correspondence. Tooele, Tooele Co., Oct. M.-Richard Warburton, age 78 years, died at his home in this city at 2 %. m. today, of apopexy. He rethed in apparent good health the night before his death. He was born at Louth, Lincoinshire, England, October 6, 1829: emigrated to Utah, in 1849, came to Tooele City the same year and endured all the priva-tions and handships incident to pioneer-ing the wilderness. Was lieutenant in the Nauvoo legion, and served in many
