BLOOMFIELD, Big Lake, county of Idaho, Dec. 26, 1865.—Edward Patterson, son of William Patterson and Jane McGregor, was born at Ryke, Allendale Parish, Northumbria, England, July 24, 1838, and died at Salt Lake City, Dec. 26, 1865, at the age of twenty-seven years. He crossed the ocean with a company of Latter-day Saints in the ship "Dale Wood," came to Pennsylvania in 1856, and crossed the plains to California in 1858, via Oregon, Bremerton, and Altimonton, Bear Lake county, Idaho, in the fall of 1859, and arrived to Salt Lake City in 1860. He reached Bloomfield in 1862, and, having secured his living by his industrious wife, Mary Newman, who had been his companion fifty-eight years, and their two daughters, of whom he has three sons and one daughter, also three grandsons and thirteen granddaughters, he entered his law office in Salt Lake City, and, after a full field of a glorious resurrection, as though passing into quiet sleep, at the ripe age of 51 years, 3 months and 12 days.
