

CARNEGIE'S GIFT TO WASHINGTON

A Handsome White Marble Library Building.
IT IS FORMALLY DEDICATED

President Makes a Happy Address, Paying Tribute to Donor's Worth—An Ovation Given the Giver.

Washington, Jan. 7.—Washington's new public library, a handsome white marble structure located on Mount Vernon square, donated to the national capital by Andrew Carnegie, was dedicated this afternoon with impressive ceremonies. President Roosevelt and members of his cabinet and men in all walks of civil and political life were participants and witnesses of the ceremonies.

Mr. Carnegie delivered the principal address. Prior to the formal exercises the Marine band rendered a special program. At the conclusion of the formal exercises the library was thrown open to the public.

President McFarland of the board of district commissioners presided over the assembly to order the introduction of the speakers. The president said:

"I count myself fortunate in attending the library ceremony in some respects as representing the people of the United States, to express their grateful appreciation of the wisdom of Mr. Carnegie in presenting this magnificent library to Washington. His great gift to a man ought to be considered as a gift to the people of the United States. The common school system of education, but it was only the foundation."

"Of those who are to stand pre-eminent as the representatives of the culture of the community, the enormous majority must educate themselves. The work done by this library is helpful, because it represents one side of the community in which a healthy work in this community must be done. Mr. Carnegie, neither you nor anyone else can make man give or cultivate. All you can do is to give a chance to add to his own wisdom, or to his own cultivation, or to his own education. This is the work that counts in the long run. It is the work that helps to build a nation. This is the true social, sociological and in every way. The man who will submit or demand to be carried is not worth carrying, and if you make the effort it helps neither him nor you."

"But every man of us needs help—needs more and more to be given the chance to show for himself the stuff that is in him, and this the free library is doing in the world of cultivation, the world of scholarship, what it should be our aim to do in the great world—political, social and developmental. It gives the opportunities and then leaving the opportunities to show how they are able to take advantage of them."

"In other words, this is the kind of gift that steers the happy middle course between the Charybdis of failure to show public spirit on the one hand, and on the other the Scylla of showing that public spirit in a way that will demoralize and paralyze those who take advantage of it. To quote an expression that I am fond of—this is equality from the two points of view of our civilization, hardness of heart and softness of head."

"I am not here to make a speech. I am here to pay tribute to the man who, as the president has several times said to perform. I have come because I feel that the movement for securing better facilities for self-training, better facilities for education in its widest, broadest and deepest sense, is one of the most important that the president of the United States could not where more appropriately come than to this building. Mr. Carnegie, at this time, to thank you for the gift that you have made to the people of the national capital."

When the applause had subsided, President Roosevelt left the auditorium, the audience rising as he passed out and the Marine band playing "America."

In a brief address H. B. McFarland, one of the commissioners of the District of Columbia, turned the building over to the board of library trustees.

President Noyes responded for the board. Mr. Noyes' speech was an eloquent tribute to the liberality of Mr. Carnegie. He referred to Mr. Carnegie as "Santa Carnegie, the nation's great gift of public libraries, who transforms by word or touch of the pen a cramped, crowded makeshift into the marble palace in which we are assembled today."

In conclusion, Mr. Noyes announced the building a "notable adornment of the city beautiful, a factor in the wonderful architectural development of the new Washington."

Mr. Carnegie was next introduced. He was given an ovation by the vast audience. He said in part:

CARNEGIE'S ADDRESS.
The free library, maintained by all the people, for all the people, knows neither rank nor birth within its walls. Even he who honors us today by his august presence, the honored guest of the nation upon earth, the elected of the majority of the English-speaking race, in positions sink into insignificance within these walls as the privilege which are not the right of his poorest and humblest fellow citizen."

"Free libraries maintained by the people are cradles of democracy, and their spread can never fail to extend."

Price of Coal Advanced.
New York, Jan. 8.—The price of coal has been advanced to \$9.50 as a minimum and some anthracite has been sold as high as \$12.50. A number of large dealers have consulted over the situation and it is probable that a meeting will be held today to promulgate a schedule of retail prices.

Chaffee Inspects Plans for Barracks.
Plattsburg, N. Y., Jan. 8.—Maj. Gen. Adna R. Chaffee, U. S. A., yesterday visited Plattsburg Barracks. The sixty-third regiment, which has been ordered to the Philippines, is now in the drill hall, after which Gen. Chaffee called upon all married men to step to the front. He closely questioned each of those who responded as to what he was doing for his family while he was in the Philippines. To every man who stated that he wished to give his family practically all his pay, Gen. Chaffee put the question "What do you do without money yourself?" and he advised them as to how much they should reserve for their own use. Gen. Chaffee's aide, Capt. Lindsay, was present with notebook and pencil and made a record of what amount each man desired, to give his family. This amount is deducted from the man's pay and sent direct to his family, the balance going to the man himself.

Suits Against Buttermelers.
For Alleged Pollution of Waters of Silver Bow.

Butte, Mont., Jan. 7.—Suits in which the damages asked amount to \$134,500 have been filed in the United States court against four of the largest Butte smelting companies because of alleged pollution of the waters of Silver Bow creek by tailings from the smelters. The smelting companies are the Butte & Boston, Parrot, Colorado and Colusa-Parrot Mining company. There are eight suits in all.

The complaints in each of the eight cases go into a history of the acquisition by the plaintiffs of the lands along the stream and of the construction and operation of the smelter. Pulverized quartz, copper and other substances are named as having been the causes which deteriorated the value of the lands and rendered the waters unfit for use on the adjacent lands or to drink.

British Trade Returns.
New York, Jan. 8.—Board of trade returns just issued, the Tribune's London correspondent says, throw light upon the foreign trade of the United Kingdom for the last 12 months. The imports amounted to \$2,644,300,282, an increase of \$24,350,430, while the exports were \$1,417,699,800, an increase of \$9,517,694. There was an increase of nearly \$30,000,000 in the year's imports of wheat and manufactured articles, and the figures showed a large increase in the exports of pig iron to the United States, which increased \$7,600,000; but

there was a decrease in the exports of pig iron to France, Germany and Holland. Iron and steel exports showed a total increase of \$20,000,000, while in regard to exports of coal there was a decrease of \$15,000,000 accompanied by an increase of \$1,500,000 tons in quantity.

FUNERAL OF SAGASTA.
Was Made Occasion for Popular Demonstration.

Madrid, Jan. 7.—The funeral of Senor Sagasta was a remarkable popular demonstration. Behind the lines of troops were crowded masses of people, mostly of the lower classes. They were silent and respectful and bared their heads as the cortege traversed two miles to the Pantheon. Every window along the line of march was filled with spectators from the upper class of society. In addition to the mourners, all the cabinet ministers, as well as representatives of King Alfonso and of the queen mother, followed the remains. Almost every public body and every class of society was represented in the funeral procession. The splendid funeral car was drawn by six horses and was followed by the king's halberds and the ushers of congress and the senate, bearing lighted tapers. It is estimated that 200,000 people were on the streets to witness the funeral.
