

HOME ITEMS.

Until joined by some more of his comrades, who crowded on Hostmark and abused him badly, leaving him finally in almost a helpless condition. Pity but the scoundrels had been nearer habitations, or where the officers could have overhauled them.

NEWS ITEMS.

A NAPLES letter-writer says that several Roman Catholic priests have declared their intentions of marriage, under the new law which makes marriage a civil rite, and one has already been united to a lady of Naples. The writer thinks this example will be somewhat extensively followed.

SEVENTY-FIVE steamboats, says the *St. Louis Dispatch*, are advertised to start in April from that city for Fort Benton on the Upper Missouri. Only a few years ago one or two boats sent up in the Spring answered all the purposes of trade.

ENGLISH and American civilization is beginning to make progress in China, as it has done in India. An English school has been opened in Peking for Chinese youth, sustained by the imperial authorities, and a Chinese official in Shanghai pays an American missionary \$2,500 a year for the same purpose.

THE University of Michigan is now the largest University in this country, containing 1,051 students, divided as follows: Medical department, 436; law, 350; literary 265. Three new assistant professors have been appointed, one in each department. The institution is well endowed, and tuition is free.

STONE is now sawn in France with rapidity and economy by means of a perforated disc of iron on which a coating of lead has been cast, the perforations serving to connect and bind the plates of lead thus formed on the two sides of the disc. The lead is kept well covered with emery, which falls on it from a reservoir above.

RECENT experiments have shown that magnesium is an excellent conductor of electricity. That, with the little tendency it has to oxidize in the atmosphere, recommends it strongly as a substitute for the wire used at present in telegraphic lines; and its general adoption depends, no doubt, on its economic production in which direction advances are made every day.

A TERRIBLE illustration of the necessity for making the doors of all places where large assemblies are gathered to open outwards has just been afforded by the destruction, by fire, of fifty-four men at Cronstadt, of which the only means of egress opened inwards, so that when the imprisoned and imperilled creatures strove to escape, their own terror gathered them *en masse* against the door, and their weight kept it firmly closed.

M. F. Plateau has been making some new experiments upon the muscular force exerted by insects. By attaching a wire to the leg of insects he ascertains the weight they draw on a given surface, and finds that a beetle, *Donacia nymphaea* can pull 42.7 of its own weight. If a horse were equally powerful he would be able to draw more than 50,000 lb. weight.
