He maintained that the system now in vogue, that of requiring a deposit on the meter, was far from satisfactory, and in his opinion a better plan would be to rent the meter to the consumer outright. The matter was referred to the city attorney for an opinion. The a partial report made by the superintendent the council members works department is \$140,000 per an-num. Mayor Brancford has recom-worded that a sinking fund be pro-vided for the redemption of the water bods. Such a fund, with the yearly interest on the bonds, would require \$125,000, which with the expenses of the department each year, \$85,000, would make \$10,000. If the mayor's advice is to be followed it will mean a raising of the water rates in this city materially in the near future.

# OGDEN WATER IMPURE.

State Chemist Harms completed last vening, an examination of water taken from sources of ice supply at Og-

len, and found it impure. His report is as follows:

is as follows: "All the samples submitted possess an uninviting appearance, the water being cloudy and containing consid-erable sediment matter of organic character. Nitrites are indicated in each sample. The residue of each organic and cinders and chars considerably. Over half of the residue in each sample is organic and volatile matter. The yield of free and abumenoid ammonia, as well as oxy-sen consumed, is very excessive in all of the waters; amply confirming the optimination of the waters by organ-ic matter. In my opinion, the above waters are filthy and unfit for culin-ary and domestic purposes." Treezing docs not kill typhold germs, but bolling will.
