P., Mr. T. and Mr. W. and his son, were unanimous in deciding, at the close of the trial on Monday; that they wished to see the Wood binder further tested on Wednesday; and that they did not care for any further test of the Osborne machine; that three of the original four would have nothing to do with the machine, even though supplied with a wire attachment; that this machine and others put out as twine binders are using wire attachments; that you refused to assist in selecting a committee, though repeatedly urged to do so; would seem sufficient to determine this contest.
The basis of Mr. Wilson's preferring the wire to the twine, "for his use," would naturally seem to be because he expected it to do better work, as otherwise, farmers universally prefer twine, if there was no difference in the price.
As to what you choose to consider "admitted nothing," opinions might differ, but most persons would consider the use of the machine for a season in that light. But you evidently misconstrued what I said, in stating that I had a document in my possession, to the effect that "the Wood Binder did the best and lightest binding and lightest work, and needed less bundles than the Osborne."
