AMERICAN ATTITUDE.

That the American government will have little difficulty in maintaining the position it has taken is made evi-dent from a review of the basis of Russian assertion of jurisdiction over the Chinese Eastern railway zone. This basis is a contract entered into the chinese government and the by the Chinese government and the Russo-Chinese bank in 1896. Many of the prominent features of this of the prominent leadures of this contract have been made the subject of a protest since by China. For in-stance, the director of the road was to be appointed by China and reside in Peking. This provision has never been complied with. The director of road is a Russian and resides at Harbi

As further establishing Russia's true Position in Manchuria, the treaty of Portsmouth, which ended the war be-tween Russia and Japan, is most explicit in terms. In this treaty the two powers agree "to completely and simultaneously evacuate Manchuria," with the exception of the leased portion of the Liaotung peninsula; to en-tirely and completely restore to the executive administration of China all parts of Manchuria now occupied by Russian and Japanese troops or which are under their control, with the exception of the above mentioned terri-tory. And again, in the same treaty: "The imperial government of Russia declares that it has no territorial advantages or preferential or exclusive concessions in Manchuria of such a nature as to impair the sovereignity of China or which are incompatible with the principle of equal opportunity."

several other powers are availing with extreme interest the announcement of the attitude of the state department at Washington, regarding the Fisher inci-dent, as this issue affects not only the administration of Harbin and Challar - Russia, but the entire question of e sovereignty of north China and uth Manchuria, Fred D. Fisher, south American consul at Harbin, has con-sistently refused to recognize or admit that he should have anything to do with the Russian administration of the terthe Russian administration of the ter-ritory, on the ground that he was ac-credited solely to China; furthermore, he has supported the protests of China against the establishment by Russia of municipalities in the railroad zone at Harbin and Chinlar, independent of the Chinas growement and his attitude Chinese government, and his attitude in this matter prompted Russia to seek an explanation of his course at Wash-

ington. It was learned here today that the German consul at Harbin had sided with Mr. Fisher against the demands of the Russian authorities, which in-volved the signing by foreign and Chinese residents of a paper agreeing to obey the ordinances of the Harbin municipal council to pay taxes. The council is composed of six members, three nominated and three elected to office. The president of the council is named by the railroad and in this manner Russian control is assured. The French consul at Harbin acquiesced in the Russian demands.

sons behind the protest of China and the support given this protest by the American and German consuls is to be less in objections to a change in the form of the Russian administration of

No further news has been received here regarding the petition of the Mon-golian princes to the Pekin government for the construction of a rallroad begolian princes to the Pekin government for the construction of a rallroad be-tween Kalgan, 125 miles northwest of Pekin, and the trans-Balkalian settle-ment of Kiaktha, which would give the trans-Siberian railroad direct connec-tion with Pekin. The latest advices are to the effect that China favored a pro-ject to continue the railroad now being completed between Pekin and Kalgan by an automobile service from this lat-

#### W. I. Chang Appears Before Magistrate for Preliminary Examination.

San Francisco, April 3 .-- Charged with the murder of Durham White

Stevens, adviser of the Japanese in Korea, I. W. Chong appeared for pre-liminary examination today before Police Judge Conlan. Many Japanese, including Consul General Kloke, were in attendance, as also were a number of Koreans. The morning session was devoted to the examination of the surgeons who attended Mr. Stevens. Their testimony was purely technical. It seemed evident from the questions asked by the attorneys for the defense that an effort will be made to show that Stevens died as a result of a surgical Stevens died as a result of a surgical operation performed after the shoot-ing, and not from the wounds in-flicted by Chang. The ear to many people is simply the outer appendage attached like a shell to each side of the head. But this outer appendage is merely a device to averate and device to arrest sound waves and protect the ear channel running into the head, into which sound is directed. finger. The other is from the upper and back part of the throat and is called the tube of Eustachias, or Eustachian tube.

III. What Is the Ear?

A curtain of living tissue stretched tightly, and called the ear drums, sep-arates these two passageways. The mechanism consists of the ear drum, the bones connected therewith, curtain of living tissue stretched

drum, the bones connected there with, and the nerves that run from the drum to the brain. If you stick your fingers into your ears or otherwise shut out the free pas-sage of air in the outer ways to the ear drum, you cannot hear. If you choke up the inner or Eus-tachian passages to the ears, you can-not hear.

Because there must be an equal air pressure on each side of the mem-braneous curtain or ear drum to make it vibrate and thus telegraph sound The ear drum is like any other drum. The ear drum is like any other drum. If it has free air pressure on both sides a concussion upon its surface will cause a resonant sound.

IV. Not Mechanics, But Medication.

There are two ways of freeing a gas

There are two ways of inceng a gas-pipe choked with frozen earth. One is to run an iron rod through it. This makes a small channel and al-lows a diminished quantity of gas to flow through. The other is to pass the vapor of al-coded hot the mine.

The other is to pass the vapor of al-cohol into the pipe. The vapor strikes the frozen earth, softens and melts first one bit and then another, until the whole frozen mass crumbles by degrees into a fine powder, and the pipe is free again. Where force is used to free a frozen pipe a damaged pipe is the result. Where an alcoholic vapor is used to free a pipe, no damage is done. It is the same with deafness.
