FATAL HOTEL FIRE.

Death Caught Like Rats in a Trap
and Burned to Death.

A LIST OF INJURED PERSONS.

Case of the Disaster—Many Families
Blessed in Minneapolis—
Another Configuration.

CHEMUNG, Aug. 14.—A hotel fire occurring in the death of a number of guests occurred this morning in a three-story structure on Chemung street, near Fifth avenue. A man jumped from the top story of the building and was killed and about a dozen others were suffocated and burned to death. The body of Harry Gandy, seven years old, has not recovered. The building was a consolidated structure occupied by a restaurant on the first floor and rooms above on the top floor. There were many guests in the building at the time the fire broke out. This was preceded in the fire was caught like a rat trap, wide open to make their escape. Three additional bodies have been taken from the ruins. They are still unclaimed.

The total number of killed is five, Edward Sherrill, a Chegong Chamber, is the only other body identified.

CHICAGO, Aug. 14.—A fire this morning destroyed a brick public school valued at \$30,000 and insured at \$10,000.

THE MINNEAPOLIS BLAZE.

150 Houses Burned and Many Persons
Houseless.

MINNEAPOLIS, Aug. 14.—The big fire was stopped just eight-twentieths of an hour after breaking out. It destroyed about one hundred and fifty houses, averaging in value from \$200 to \$500, fifty million feet of lumber, with \$200,000, one million feet of shingles, and \$100,000 worth of hardware, axles, and such, and each and every business, bringing the total loss up to about \$1,150,000 with an estimated insurance of \$300,000. An unknown child was found in the debris.
