Railroads Agree on Storage Rates

Freight Remaining in Charge of
Roads Over 48 Hours Sub-
ject to Demurrage.

MEETING OF SCHOOL BOARD.

Prof. Kent and Pupils Give Song Service in Fourth Ward Chapel Sunday Evening.

Ogden, July 21.—The various freight companies doing business out of Ogden have combined on the matter of charging storage on all freight consigned to Ogden that remains at any of the freight houses over 48 hours. The management has had considerable difficulty at times with many small establishments and individuals who have had consignments of freight in the local depots sometimes for a month before removing it, and it is on that account the following letter has been sent to all the business houses in Ogden.

Ogden, Utah, July 19, 1906.
We are advised by Mr. C. H. Griffin, commissioner, Utah Car Service association, (storage department), that agreement has been entered into by the Denver & Rio Grande R. R., Union Pacific R. R., Oregon Short Line R. R., Central Pacific R. R., San Pedro Los Angeles & Salt Lake R. L. and the Nevada & California R. R. that, commencing Aug. 1, 1906, no storage charge will be made on all less than carload consignments of freight held in any of the railroad warehouses, car pens or grounds more than forty-eight (48) hours, awaiting disposition of consignee or consignor, at the following rates:

One (1) cent per hundred (100) pounds, or fraction thereof, per day, or

KICKED BY A HORSE.

Little Peter Shape of Eden Frightfully Injured.

Ogden, July 21.—The 10-year-old son of Peter Shape, residing at Eden, was kicked in the head by a horse at his home in that place yesterday and his skull crushed. Half of the lad's head was stripped to the bone and he was picked up for dead. Drs. Rich and Osgood and G. W. Perkins, summoned from Ogden, to attend the injured child, found that the skull, two inches long and one and one-half inches wide was removed and the skull tramped and hope of his recovery is entertained.

TO PARK DEPOT GROUNDS.

The management of the Union Depot company's grounds have received a number of bids from landscape gardeners and others who have figured on the plating and laying out of the grounds between Twenty-fourth and Twenty-sixth streets in front of the depot building. Next week it is expected the bids will be opened and the bid let for the doing of the work. Ogden has the finest depot building in the state which is now being remodeled on the interior making it much more convenient, and should have great surrounding it equally as beautiful. With the large park ground in front of the depot two blocks away in the grass, with shrubbery and flower beds, strangers cannot help but get a much more favorable impression of the city.

The Civic League is doing much for the beautifying and improvement of Ogden. It is principally through its efforts the railroad companies have consented to the improvement of the depot grounds. Through the work of the league many homes are being made to look much more beautiful and especially the grounds surrounding them. On August 1, the \$25 cash prize is to be awarded by the committee of ladies for the best kept lawn in Ogden.

Ogden, July 21.—At the meeting of the board of education last evening the following teachers were elected: Grace B. Bobbitt, Zetta Dalton, Mrs. Mary Floyd, Nelle A. The finance committee reported cash on hand \$2,484.75. The Chipp building site were reported sold for \$900 to J. G. Kilstrom. A payment of \$2,200 was ordered made to Contractor G. A. Whitmeyer, as partial payment on his contract for the remodeling of the depot building. He was also allowed \$28.25 for extra work done on the depot building. Smith & Hadlock were allowed \$200 in part payment for preparing plans and specifications for the Lewis school addition. City Engineer, Parker called the attention of the board to the fact that no building permit had been taken out for this work and the clerk was directed to notify the contractor to comply with the city ordinance.

MUNICIPAL LEAGUE.

New Proposition Suggested by Mayor Robinson of Logan.

Provo, July 21.—Mayor Frisby has received a letter from Mayor Robinson of Logan which reads:

"In looking over the splendid achievements of the municipal leagues of eastern states, I have been convinced for a long time that such an organization in the State of Utah would aid a good deal for operation."

"It seems to me that it would be a means of municipal officers getting acquainted with the merits of municipalities becoming more common. We could profit by each other's experience and be helpful to each other by way of suggestions on matters new to one and old to the other. We could counsel concerning desirable state legislation and doubtless procure more suitable laws for our guidance. We could make city ordinances uniform, as far as practicable, etc."

"I am convinced that such a movement would result in growth and improvement in the towns and cities of Utah. Other interests of the state organize with good results, as do the municipalities of other states."

"I have no suggestions to offer as to methods of procedure, or details of any kind, but would ask what you think of the matter."

"Kindly write me regarding the same, and if a sufficient number takes kindly to the idea, we can agree upon a time and place for a first meeting, at which the whole matter can be given consideration and, if thought wise, an organization effected."
