GIVING SIGHT TO THE BLIND. AN OLD WOMAN WHOSE LIFE-LONG

At the recent meeting in New London, Conn., of the American Ophthalmological Society, the proceedings of which are reported in the Medical News, Dr. L. Webster Fox read a clinical paper on a case of congenital cataracts successfully removed in a patient 60 years of age. Omitting the purely technical portions, Dr. Fox's paper was as follows:

On Feb. 4, 1884, a negress presented erself at the eye clinic of the Germanown hospital, suffering with cataracts. The lenses were opaque, with well-marked deposite of calcareous concretions, situated in the interior or visible portions of the lenses.


