REVIVAL NOT PROBABLE.

REVIVAL NOT PROEAGLE. From present indications a revival of the company is not probable. With various cases pending against the company, a bonded indebtedness of \$1,000,000 and a probable floating in-debtedness of between \$400,000 and \$500,000 it would appear as if the bond-holders would be the first to make a move. One avenue by which the company may be revived is by clean-ing up the indettedness. Whether this will be done lies within the power, of the company. As the company is still under the ban of the injunction and its business was mostly confined to the smelting copper ores it does not have a bright prospect. During the panle the com-pany lost many of its customers through the low price of metals. Many of the companies were obliged to cease shipping. Since then they have found a better market but are still unable to secure adequate smelting facilities.

Union Yielded Ninety Million in Gold Last Year.

Last rear. Washington, Dec. 31.—The United States produced \$90,435,700 worth of gold, 'and \$37,299,700 worth of sli-ver in 1905', according to statements obtained from mints, assay offices, smelting establishments and the pro-duct of mines. As compared with the previous year 1907, showed a decrease of \$4,000,000 in gold production and about one million decrease in the sli-ver produced.

ver produced. The rank of principal gold produc-ers is as follows: Colorado, Alaska, California, Nevada, Utah, South Dakota, Montana and Arizona.

Vermont appeared as a gold pro-ducer for the first time in many years. Twenty-seven states and territories participated in the production of silver, the leading being: Colorodo, Utah, Montana, Idaho, Nevada and Arizona,

Arizona. The geological survey attributes the decrease in gold and silver production in 1907 to the financial panic of that year which forced many smelling works to suspend.

The property was purchased by Mr. Peery a short time before his death. The bond given in the case was fixed at \$500 and was made out this morning. A hearing on the tempor-ary injunction will by had at Tonopah on January 11.
