CITY COUNCIL.

The City Council met in regular session June 22nd, Mayor Scott presiding. The following members responded to roll call. Pickard, Spafford, Karrick, Heath, Folland, Hyde, Hardy, Tuddenham, Young, Anderson, Lynn, Parsons, Pendleton and James. were read: The Salt Lake Brewing Company asked for a rebate on liquor license. Committee on license.

C. F. Fisher asked for a rebate on real estate license. Committee on license.

W. D. Bowring et al asked that the temporary fence around the Cunningham corner be lowered from six to four feet in height. Committee on streets.

Sullivan & Lange, saloon-keepers, asked that the unexpired portion of their liquor license be remitted in favor of the Salt Lake Brewing Company. Committee on license.

John E. Butler asked that the grade for sidewalks on the south side of Second South street from Fifth East Street for a distance of 165 feet west be changed. Committee on streets.

Mount & Griffin asked for an appropriation of \$2000 for street sprinkling. Granted.

G. D. Amos et al. represented that the slaughter house near the Salt Lake Mill and Elevator company's ground northwest of the Warm Springs, was a nuisance and asked that it be abated. Sanitary and quarantine committee.

Josephine M. Spear asked that the time for laying the sidewalk on West Third South street be deferred. Committee on streets.

E. F. Hanna asked to be allowed to lay a cement sidewalk instead of asphalt. Committee on streets.

G. W. Walton and Elihu Wry represented that the Great Salt Lake & Hot Springs railway company, in constructing its grade on Monroe street, had done considerable damage to abutting property, and they asked that the company be requested to conform to the

orders previously made by the Council. Committee on streets.

The Mountain Ice & Cold Storage company asked that a wagon bridge be erected over the irrigation ditch at the intersection of Third West and Ninth South streets. Committee on streets.

William P. Rowe, Samuel Gallezi, Levi Axtell, Ed. Milford and M. Hutchison, employed by the city watermaster, asked that their salaries be increased from \$75 to \$100 per month. Committee on irrigation.

P. W. Madsen protested against a franchise being granted to the Rapid Transit company for an additional track on First South street, between State and Main. Committee on streets.

L. B. Coates et al. asked that a slaughter house nuisance, on Third South street over the Jordan river, be abated. Sanitary and quarantine committee.

Mrs. Kate McCornick asked for a remission of hotel license. Committee on license.

The Salt Lake, Halley & Puget Sound Railway company presented a communication in which it signified the acceptance of the railway franchise granted it by the council on April 21st, of the present year.

George E. Woolley asked for the erection of a flume across Parley's canyon conduit. Committee on irrigation.

Mrs. Dudler represented that her property had been damaged to the amount of \$1500 by surplus water coming from the Parley's canyon conduit, and asked that the amount be appropriated. Committee on claims.

Rudolph Alf et al. asked for an extension of sewer laterals on Fifth South street. Committee on sewerage.

R. Kletting asked for permission to pile building material, for the erection of the State Bank of Utah, on First South street, immediately west of the Salt Lake Theatre, for four months. Granted.

Ex-Policeman Lowry asked that he be allowed twelve days' pay. Committee on police.

Henry Grundsides asked to be allowed to maintain a hothack stand on Second South street. Committee on streets.

R. Kletting asked permission to pile building material on Commercial street for four months. Granted.

Mary B. Burbridge and J. W. Burbridge asked that the tax assessed against them for extending the water mains be canceled. Committee on waterworks.

FROM THE BOARD OF PUBLIC WORKS.

The Board of Public Works reported that a contract had been entered into with the Pacific Paving company of Utah for laying 150,000 feet of bituminous or asphaltic rock sidewalk pavement on both sides of State street, between South Temple and Fourth South streets, and on Second South street between Second East and Fifth West streets, and on Third South between State and Second East streets, and between West Temple and Third West streets, and asked that action be taken on the same.

The board also submitted the following abstract of the bids received:

PAVING PROPOSITION.

The board of public works presented the following communication from W. H. Remington, president of the Stradamant company:

We herewith beg your honorable body to consider the proposition from this company to pave with our Stradamant asphaltic mastic one block, including intersections already awarded to us, in the streets of this city, the pavement to be our standard pavement. The price per square foot to be paid therefor to be determined upon the same basis as the contracts to be let for the same character of work on the 20th of July next. The conditions and guarantee to also comply with the specifications as already accepted by your body. We desire that a full block of pavement in addition to the intersection above mentioned for reason that paying the intersection furnishes too small an area to thoroughly demonstrate the superior qualities of our stradamant pavement for the reason that inasmuch as the intersection will adjoin dirt streets, mud and dust will be tracked over it, thus concealing the surface, which we desire to appear clean to the eyes of the public and any inspectors that your board may appoint to investigate it; also that some of the members of your honorable body expressed themselves to the effect that they had now sufficient knowledge of the stradamant and other materials which are to be bid upon on July 20. In view of that fact, we desire as much for an educator, as for any other purpose, to have our street paving tested before that date. We submit herewith, reports from the engineers of the Leland Stanford, Jr., university, at Palo, Alto, California, and also a report from the chemist of the board of supervisors of the city of San Francisco, which we trust will meet with careful consideration.
