

BRYAN'S NEBRASKA TOUR HAS ENDED

Less Than Week Made Forty-Two Set Speeches and as Many Informal Ones.

LARGELY ON LOCAL TOPICS.

But Always Touched on National Subject—To Exterminate Trusts is To Revive Business.

Omaha, June 3.—The week's speaking tour of William J. Bryan through the northern and western portions of Nebraska ended with a re-arranged speech at Columbus late this afternoon, and he arrived in Omaha this evening. He has made 42 set speeches and nearly that many informal responses since he left home last Thursday. In most instances these addresses have had a home color to them, but in no instance has he failed to touch on national politics, and he has directed his principal effort to opposing the present financial system, and in every speech made he has pointed out what he considered the weakness of the currency measure passed by Congress during its closing sessions. He started from Kimball, Neb., at 10 o'clock this morning, making his first stop at North Platte, where he spoke to a gathering at the opera house composed chiefly of railroad men. He assailed the railroads for cornering employees into making petitions to legislative bodies opposing anti-railroad legislation.

The largest meeting of the day, and the one which really brought up his trip, was at Lexington, where he was practically suspended during his stay in the town. All the principal buildings were decorated in honor of his visit, and the schools were dismissed at noon.

He addressed an open air meeting at the high school grounds, where a large crowd, representing both the city and county population, gathered on the grounds. Mr. Bryan's reception at Lexington was a fitting climax to a trip which he considered the most important, and still the most pleasant, he has ever made over his home state. He took occasion this afternoon to commend the Bryan volunteers, both locally and throughout the country, for their work of organization, and presented several suggestions for further work along this line.

When Mr. Bryan arrived in Omaha tonight, he expressed himself as delighted with his trip and with the reception he received everywhere. He remained in the city tonight and will go home Thursday morning.

PRATISES LA FOLLETTE.

In Mr. Bryan's speech at Lexington is eloquent Senator La Follette for his opposition to the emergency currency bill, saying:

"Senator La Follette is in sympathy with the masses and has made a great fight against great odds. They put him in the last Republican national convention, and I cannot predict what they will do to him in the next one."

When the president picked up Mr. La Follette for the candidate of his party for president, he was looking for a capable gentleman he could not have any better, but if he was looking for a reformer he made a great mistake. Mr. La Follette is a man who knows better than that. Take, for instance, the harvest trust. It does not care whether the farmer buys or not. It does not care whether anything the farmer buys, but it soon will if left alone. If you were to extinguish that concern, would it destroy every other concern that manufactures farm implements?"

"Congress is vested with power over interstate commerce and could control these trusts. If the business of the harvest trust was reduced 50 per cent there would be competition, which would result in cheaper prices for the farmer. Business would be increased by the sale of more implements, and more men would be employed. Thus competition would help every element of society. When you exterminate trusts you revive business instead of destroying it."

FINANCIAL QUESTION.

Reverting to the financial question, Mr. Bryan said:

"The recent experience through which we have passed affords a lesson. During the 10 years it has been in power the Republican party has permitted to be issued \$100,000,000 of fiat money or watered stock by great corporations. Recently the work of squeezing out the water began. Banks became cautious, and when the great concern could not pay back their loans western people woke up one morning to find a notice from the banks that they could not have their money to use in their own business. A railroad president does not make his fortune by saving his salary. With a salary of \$100,000 a year he could only receive \$5,000,000 in 50 years—hardly enough to buy a respectable foreign title. That amount does not go far in Wall street. It used to be said that the Democratic party had a corner on panics, but recently the Republican party has threatened to put it out of the panic business."

"Now comes Congress to the relief of the banks with an emergency currency. When the campaign began to secure this law the big bankers refused a greenback currency because they knew they would lose control of the issuance of money. The law will not furnish relief. What is required is confidence—the same kind of confidence our Republican friends were demanding 12 years ago. This confidence can be secured, in my opinion, only through a bank guaranty fund to protect the depositors against loss in failed banks. The big banks oppose this idea because they fear that if the little banks were sound they would get all the deposits. But the only way to protect the system has already been vindicated by its success in Oklahoma."

THAW HEARING ADJOURNED.

Poughkeepsie, N. Y., June 3.—The hearing on the motion to have Harry K. Thaw transferred from the Mat-tawan state hospital to some other institution, which was to have come be-

fore Supreme Court Justice Morschauser in this city next Saturday, has been adjourned for one week at the request of District Attorney Jerome, and with the consent of counsel for Thaw.

In the meantime Thaw remains in jail here, still occupying the commodious room of Sheriff Chandler, who is in Europe.

MAURETANIA GOING AFTER A NEW RECORD.

New York, June 4.—The fast turbine steamship Mauretania of the Cunard line, which arrived here on Monday night after breaking three records, and was unable to dock until 7:30 a. m. Tuesday, took aboard the last bucketful of her 6,000 tons of coal for her eastward trip last night at 6 o'clock. She arrived here three days behind her schedule time because of a storm in the English Channel and her sailing day from New York had to be changed from yesterday to today.

It is believed that she will make a record run eastward to London, using the three of her four propellers that brought her westward with three records to her credit.

The big liner, moreover, is not the only ship to leave port today that is preparing for a record. The French line steamship La Provence, which boasts of beating the Deutsch-land over the long course, will do her best to give the Mauretania a close run as she sails today simultaneously with the Cunard steamer at 10 a. m. The French vessel has made the run to the Lizard in 6 days, 2 hours and 48 minutes, and the long course of 24,300 knots. Besides the Mauretania and La Provence, there will be other big transatlantic liners leaving port today at the same hour.

JAMES H. BRADY IN FRED DUBOIS

Republican State Chairman of Idaho Tells Some Home Truths Regarding Volatile Politician.

IS DRIVING SETTLERS AWAY.

Tactics of Former Senator is Injuring The Gem State in the Eyes of Outside Citizens.

"The future of the state of Idaho is being placed in jeopardy by Fred Dubois and his followers." This emphatic declaration was made last night by James H. Brady, Republican state chairman of Idaho. Mr. Brady was in the city yesterday between trains.

Whether it be the desire of Dubois to destroy Idaho or not, Mr. Brady declared himself unable to say. That he is doing so, he declared with unmistakable emphasis. The statement is a general one. To bring it to point, Mr. Brady related the story of the opening of the Twin Falls land sale the first of the week, declaring that every person present when the trains came in with eastern homeseekers would corroborate him in his statements.

WAR ON THE "MORMONS."

"When those prospective settlers, home builders of the finest sort, come into Idaho, what was the first thing they saw? They saw a train loaded down with the followers of Fred T. Dubois. Everywhere along that train were banners proclaiming war upon the Mormons of Idaho. It was patent to them that strife is prevailing, that a church is being assailed and that the political campaign of the state is being waged not along the lines suggested by the term 'politics,' but by demanding that a class of people are to be denied the right of franchise because of their religious professions."

HATRED THE KEYNOTE.

"When those homeseekers saw the Dubois adherents assembling to parade the streets headed by a band and with their colors flying, they saw a political procession in which hatred, not of political opponents, but of a church was the keynote of their march. Banners were being carried in that procession: 'Mormonism is a curse,' 'Lust and Treason,' 'Mormon Church: Money, Women & Power,' 'We Fight the Mormon Man.' What was their conclusion? Those settlers saw that Idaho is not a good place to be if the religious belief of a people is to be made the basis of a political campaign. Who has been the result? Hundreds of those people did not wait even to complete preliminary arrangements for the great land drawing in which they hoped to take part. They boarded the first train leaving Idaho and returned to their homes. Many others continued on their way and are now in Oregon and Washington seeking new homes. Those people did not stay long enough to learn the true strength of Dubois. They imagined that it is great from the showing made. They did not learn the strength of Dubois, but they learned that he is not as strong as his outward appearance. They gained a wrong impression of the Gem state."

GOOD PLACE TO LIVE.

"Idaho is a good place to live. Idaho offers great opportunities to the homeseekers and the state is in need of them. The Twin Falls opening was the greatest land sale in the history of the world. The land to be thrown open is full of promise and the class of citizenship represented by those homeseekers who came to the sale is the class that Idaho needs. She needs the sturdy, hardworking, self-reliant profession and instead of driving them away by alarming them with outward signs of strife, the people of the state should be united in welcoming them into the state and making of Idaho the state which her resources and possibilities promise."

"Dubois is claiming a majority following in the Democratic party of Idaho. We divide the party into two parts in Idaho, calling the sincere Democratic party the Stalwarts and the Dubois wing the Duboisites. The Duboisites are claiming a majority and have the state tied up and that they will go into the convention at Wallace in August, and control it. This in my opinion, is not true. Dubois cannot control the state."

THE SITUATION.

"The situation confronting the Stalwarts is this: They have no leader of the power of Dubois. He is a politician. His political enemies are John E. Nugent, I. K. Perky, Frank Martin, J. C. Rice and the editor of the Capital News, Briston, and others of course. There is not among them a man of Dubois' political training in generalship. If they had such a man, the Stalwart wing would have no fight ahead of them. They would have only to hold their ground and Dubois could not gain control. With the forces of Nez Perce, Canyon and Ada counties the Stalwarts are most strongly entrenched against Dubois, and the war is being fought on the lines of a normal election. The Wallace convention and triumph against him."

IS A DIFFERENT STORY.

"I am telling you how the situation is as to the Democrats. With the Republicans it is a different story. The Republicans are represented in Idaho with a normal polling capacity of 20,000. Against this, the ruptured condition of the Democratic party is pitiful. The result of a state election is only a repetition of past history. The majorities will all pile up in the Republican column. Dubois knows this and he cannot elect a state ticket. He knows that as well as I do, or any other man in Idaho, the Democrats are hopeless against hope when they enter a campaign. Dubois does think he can command a vote in the counties in which he claims his strength to pack the legislature. When the fall ballots are counted, he will learn how forlorn has been his hope."

DUBOIS PLANS.

"Dubois will organize an 'American' party. He will not call it that, though. It will probably be the 'Independent Democrats,' or some other such name. He will go into the Denver convention demanding that his delegation from Idaho be recognized on the convention floor and that his plank against polygamy enter the Democratic national platform. He asserts that in Bryan he has an ally. A most powerful ally, he claims Bryan to be, and even people believe that Bryan recognizes Dubois as an old line Democrat in whom strength centers for Idaho's presidential campaign. Dubois expects to receive the endorsement of Bryan in regard to the Dubois plank and they say that Bryan is turning to Dubois in the hope of polling the Idaho vote, to win with Dubois in a Republican state, in other words, I cannot even attempt to predict what will be the result of Dubois' professions at Denver, whether or not he and his delegation will be seated."

IS WRECKING STATE.

"Again let me say that Dubois is wrecking the state to which he came as an appointive officer. Until his eclipse of recent happening he has been in politics to earn his bread. Now he is in oblivion as far as official wage earning capacity is concerned. He is not wealthy. His strength is in his personal magnetism and leading ability to predict what will be the result of his adopted state into ruin, driving home builders away and deflecting from the country great investments by eastern capitalists."

BOUND TO LOSE.

"There is such a vast majority opposed to him, however, that they will win in the end. Prosperity and success and harmony in Idaho is coming, but only after Dubois is vanquished. His war prolongs the delay, but he will lose. All Idaho, including Dubois, knows that, but Dubois is not a man who will quit until he is beaten. Even then he will smoulder and endeavor to inflame another campaign of ruin. That majority I mention as opposed to Dubois is composed of Idaho's best citizenship. It is that portion of Idaho's population that is pushing development work, that is interesting capital in Idaho. Not far distant is the visit of a special train bearing eastern bankers and investors to Idaho. They will be taken in charge by energetic citizens desiring to show their actual wealth waiting development. With the promise offered by Idaho for the future, the immense good that will follow this visit of wealthy men to the Gem state is assured. Idaho will come to the front because of her latent resources, but a united effort to defeat Dubois is the keynote of the situation. The greater portion of the people of Idaho are opposed to his propaganda and results may soon follow to prove this statement."

Mr. Brady at the time he was interviewed, had not learned the results of yesterday's convention at Twin Falls, though he predicted that Dubois would have a delegation for Denver. He did not, however, intimate that the Stalwarts would be defeated, but rather indicated a belief that a split with two delegations would probably result, though he refused to forecast with any definite statement in this regard. Mr. Brady left the city shortly before midnight for Boise. Friends in this city who had talked with him during the
