

BANKERS ARE HOLDING OFF

Large Ones of New York Are Not Offering to Buy the Panama Bonds.

SAID TO WANT ASSURANCES

That Money Paid Will Be Left On Deposit and Not Withdrawn.

New York, Nov. 20.—The government's issue of \$100,000,000 in treasury certificates of indebtedness continued today to engross the attention of New York bankers, who apparently have not reached a definite decision as to the course they shall pursue. The descriptions so far received at the treasury department seem to indicate that the larger banks in this city are temporarily withholding their offers of purchase. The sub-treasury officials are not disposed to make public the amount of subscriptions received, but during the past three days, saying they are merely acting as transmitting agents for the treasury department at Washington, to which point the offers are being forwarded as fast as they come in.

The fact that the banks are holding off for the time being has led to the more or less definite report that the heads of the larger banks are desirous of obtaining some sort of assurance from Washington that the money paid out here for the purchase of the new securities will be left on deposit in local institutions.

The currency premium varied between 2 1/2 and 2 3/4 during most of today's negotiations, with some transactions as high as 2 per cent. With the price of currency ruling at these figures, it was said the bankers could not see their way clear to purchase the certificates of indebtedness at the present time, other arrangements than the retention of the purchase money on deposit in this city. The money shipments from New York to the interior have been quite heavy recently, and the bankers here are anxious to continue this means of assistance to the general financial situation. The advance in the price of currency today is attributed to the demands from the interior for payroll purposes. The calls for cash came yesterday from New England, but today they were more general and came from nearly every section of the country. The approach of week-end always enlarges the demand for ready money.

There has been absolutely no indication as yet of a definite bid for the treasury certificates forthcoming from the associated banks of this city, such as has been indicated since Monday, unless it be in the fact that several large banks were called in today. The revival of the reports today of the possibility of a favorable outcome to the negotiations for an American loan in France, with the treasury certificates as a basis, has strengthened the rumor of an associated bid from New York bankers, the government securities, upon which the loan is to be based, that they may be considered as collateral for gold loans under the rules of the Bank of France.

Some of the New York banks are said to be holding off in the matter of subscriptions so as to give the small investors with hoarded savings a chance to put in their claims and thus draw into the market a considerable amount of the certificates were largely designed. Nearly all of the larger banks here have received orders from customers to make payments in the certificates for their account. These purchases are to be made out of deposits already in hand, however, and are not bringing new money into the market.

A GOLDFIELD PLAN.

To Use Stamped Gold Bars as Monetary Medium.

Goldfield, Nev., Nov. 20.—If a plan now under consideration by W. E. Bowen, manager of the Nevada-Goldfield reduction works, is consummated, goldfield will soon have a circulating medium that will relieve to a great extent the scarcity of real money with which the camp is afflicted.

The plan is to take the bullion produced by the mills, make it into bars and stamp thereon the value, which will be used as money. The question of the legality of the plan and the possible conflict with the money law of the land is now being investigated. At present the three reduction works of the camp, the Nevada-Goldfield, the Consolidation, and the Nevada, are producing about \$500,000 a day, but this amount could easily be quadrupled by running on ore of a higher grade. At the present rate the camp could produce \$500,000 a month in gold. James R. Davis of the Nevada Mountain Mining company has agreed to put the bullion from that mill into circulation in the same way, producing one of these great parasites and not be aware of it.

CALIFORNIA LEGISLATURE.

After Two Days' Session Discovered It Cannot Act.

Sacramento, Cal., Nov. 20.—After convening in extra session for two days, it has developed that the proper financial relief legislation and the rehabilitation of the courts on special holidays cannot be completed. With the legislature under the present call of Gov. Gillett, and that a supplementary proclamation must be issued. Such was the conclusion arrived at late tonight by a sub-committee of the senate judiciary committee. It was discovered that legislation was being attempted that was inhibited by the governor's call.

The legislature is endeavoring to pass measures starting the judicial machinery of the courts on holidays, but prohibiting ministerial acts or all monetary transactions on such days, for the better protection of the banks, and creditors alike. The governor's proclamation contains only the words "judicial acts" in the call for legislation for the courts.

STEVE ADAMS' TRIAL.

Jury May Have the Case in Its Hands by Saturday Night.

Spokane, Wash., Nov. 20.—A special to the Spokesman-Review from Idaho, Idaho, says:

After being on the witness stand almost continuously since 10 o'clock Tuesday morning undergoing direct and cross-examination, Steve Adams, who is on trial here for the alleged murder of Fred Tyler, has let down, and Clarence Darrow, for the defense, said his side would finish within half an hour tomorrow. The state's rebuttal will not take long and it is possible that the arguments may be begun some time tomorrow. In this event the jury will have the case by Saturday night. James H. Harty, leading attorney for the state, was at Adams all day. Two minor witnesses were called on direct and cross-examination by the defense, and then Adams again underwent cross-examination. Adams was had when planned close on a date or an accident, and like a number of those who testified for him, crunched behind. "I don't remember," he said, "the cross-examination was far more exacting and much longer than at the former trial."

GOMPERS CREATES A BIG SENSATION

Told Labor Federation Conventions of an Attempt Made to Bribe Him.

BUT ACCUSED MAN DENIES IT.

Broughton Brandenberg Makes Statement Repudiating Charges Made Against Him.

Norfolk, Va., Nov. 20.—A great sensation was created in the American Federation of Labor this afternoon by President Gompers in his speech replying to the attacks upon him and other officers of the federation by the Manufacturers' association, when he told of an alleged attempt to bribe him at the Victoria hotel New York, in October, by a young newspaper man, giving him the name as Charles Brandenberg, the latter, President Gompers said, having declared that he represented the National Manufacturers' association, and was here to offer him immunity from all exposures and make him financially secure for the remainder of his life if he would sign a certain paper and otherwise aid in the "exposure" of the other leaders in the American Federation of Labor with the view of virtually destroying the influence of organized labor.

The paper, President Gompers said, was to support to have the signature of when he (Gompers) was ill in 1905. This paper, Mr. Gompers said, he had preserved, and while deathlike stillness prevailed in the convention, President Gompers drew forth the original document and read it. Mr. Gompers, during his recital of the alleged attempt at bribery, called upon different delegates present who were with him at the time of the interview with Brandenberg, to verify his statements. The delegates, rising in their seats, did.

At the close of President Gompers' speech there was a great demonstration. Victor L. Berger of Milwaukee, the Socialist opponent of Mr. Gompers, declaring that although he had come to the convention bitterly opposed to the re-election of the committee, he will be the one this year to move to make his election unanimous, with a vote of confidence not only to President Gompers, but also to the other officials of the American Federation of Labor.

"This," declared Mr. Berger, "is the answer of the Socialists to the Manufacturers' association."

A motion picture of the ill-fated Springfield, Ill., reporting that the Illinois mine workers had voted confidence in Gompers, and denouncing the Manufacturers' association, received immediate consideration and was adopted amid excitement.

DENIES GOMPERS' ACCUSATION.

New York, Nov. 20.—Broughton Brandenberg, president of the National Institute of Immigration, and a magazine writer, said tonight that he was the man referred to by President Gompers of the American Federation of Labor, when the latter, at the convention in Norfolk today declared that one "Charles Brandenberg," a newspaperman, attempted to bribe him to take part in an "exposure" of other federation leaders.

In a statement dictated tonight, Mr. Brandenberg emphatically denied that he had attempted to bribe Gompers. He also stated that he had no connection with the National Manufacturers' association and that his dealings with Gompers were solely in the interests of a publication which he represented. He, himself, he said, had been the intended victim of a plot, had been failed, and was an effort to forestall the effect of what he knew was about to be published.

Brandenberg's statement in part follows:

"I have been collecting for a magazine data on the conduct of the American Federation of Labor by Samuel Gompers and certain others of its principal officers, since its organization. The material has gradually grown into what will be a great sensation when it is disclosed. Mr. Gompers has made an effort to forestall this, for months by a diabolical plot, tracked by spies, and Mr. Gompers felt sure that I had a sufficiency of material to make a serious case."

The statement continues to the effect that a party visited Mr. Brandenberg at the Hotel Victoria, where he was stopping and attempted to buy him off. The offer, he declared, he said he had declined, and he said that he had declined other offers of a similar nature since he began his investigations. The caller said that he was open to a counter proposition. This party, Brandenberg says, offered to assist him in the work he was doing.

The statement then continues: "I told him that I was about to leave the south coast of the United States, and that I would communicate with him as soon as I had anything to say. Various communications passed between us up to Oct. 15. On that date Mr. Gompers came in New York to meet me. We then together discussed a proposition. I am not connected with the National Manufacturers' association, but his proposition was that I must be taken up by them as the parties who are principally interested. James W. Vanhook, president of the Manufacturers' association, was in the city at that time at the Waldorf, but I did not know him. While Mr. Gompers and I were conducting discussions, and I was endeavoring to get legal counsel, my men in the Hotel Victoria found that there was a plot laid for me on Sunday, the 25th. This I then successfully evaded and called negotiations with Mr. Gompers off before the officers of the Manufacturers' association. Mr. Gompers wished to know what I had secured in the way of material in the south, and in order to mislead him I gave him a fictitious typewritten page incomplete and unsigned. This is the paper which he has read so dramatically. I am a friend of labor unionism and want to see the members of honest labor in the control of honest leaders. Mr. Gompers has foolishly precipitated a storm on the heads of himself and his friends. I shall have more to say tomorrow."

PROHIBITION CONVENTION.

Chicago, Nov. 20.—The national convention for the selection of the prohibition party will be held in Columbus, Ohio, during the first week of June, 1902. That fact was announced at the meeting of the party in this city today.

Fifty hundred and eighty delegates and alternates will attend, the ratio being one delegate and one alternate for each 100 votes cast for Jacob S. Law for president in 1904.

Charles R. Jones of Chicago was elected chairman of the national committee. W. G. Goldsborough of Minneapolis secretary, and Felix M. McWhorter of Indianapolis treasurer. The National Prohibitionist was endorsed as the official organ of the party.

OHIO POLITICAL FIGHT HAS BEGUN

League of Republican Clubs Committee Endorse Foraker for Re-election and President.

Taft's Manager Replies.

Hopes Action Will Bring Opportunity For Republicans of State to Express Their Preference.

Columbus, O., Nov. 20.—United States Senator J. B. Foraker of Ohio was today endorsed for re-election to the senate and for the Republican nomination for president at a joint meeting of the executive and advisory committees of the Ohio League of Republican clubs, at a meeting held in this city. The committees also declared that they have no sympathy whatever with the proposition that has been advanced that Senator Foraker be eliminated and retired from public life because he was not able to agree with the president as to the rate bill or joint stockhold for New Mexico and Arizona, nor about the Brownsville matter. "The action of the joint committee at once brought out a challenge from F. V. Vorse, manager of the Taft presidential campaign, for a popular primary to determine the choice of the Ohio Republicans of a candidate for president."

The meeting of the joint committee of the Ohio Republican league was held this afternoon. About 5,000 ardent supporters of Foraker, members of the committees or holding proxies were in attendance. The resolution endorsing Senator Foraker said, in part: "With our sincere respect for the president, the policy of protection to American industries and American labor would not fear the attacks of its enemies, whether made in the open by avowed free traders or by those who, in the guise of friends, profess to improve it by a downward revision of duties, and every American citizen, white or black, and no matter how humble, would feel that there would be a fearless enforcement of laws that have been enacted for the protection of his rights."

"At this time of business depression and painful uncertainty as to financial conditions, his nomination would be especially helpful. It would arouse the old-time spirit of Republicanism, restore confidence and insure victory."

Joseph Benson Foraker as our standard bearer, and appeal to Republicans everywhere to join us in his support."

"When asked for an explanation relative to the action taken at the meeting, Mr. Vorse, manager of the Taft campaign, directed the following statement:

"The resolution professes that the committee is representing the 88 counties of Ohio. As a matter of fact, the members of the committee were not elected by the Republicans of the several counties of this state. At the time this committee was announced it was generally understood that it was appointed, and its members were named by a friend and representative of Senator Foraker."

"The action of the committee, therefore, is not surprising. I hope that this action may precipitate what the friends of Secy. Taft so much desire, and that is an opportunity for the expression by the Republicans of Ohio of their choice for president. I am satisfied Ohio Republicans are overwhelmingly for Taft."

"Attention was called by friends of Secy. Taft to section 13 of the constitution of the Ohio League of Republican clubs, which says:

"This league shall not in any manner endeavor to influence the action of any national, state, county or municipal convention, nor shall it incite as a league any preference for any candidate before any political convention, nor shall it, as a league, recommend any person as an applicant for any official position."

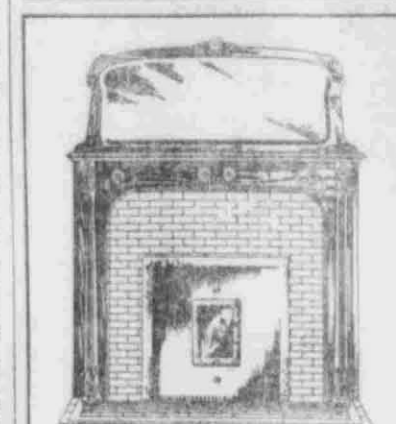
