A New York Sensation.

(New York Correspondence of the Salt

Lake Herald.)

A terrible sensation has been

created among the political and

fashionable circles and parties

among the club men and leading

members of the legal profession,

through the publication of the nar-

rative of a woman's grievous

wrongs at the hands of a very

prominent politician and aspirant

AN ORDINANCE

Relating to Houses of Ill-

Fame and Prostitution.

Section 1.—Be it ordained by

the City Council of Salt Lake City:

That, whoever keeps a house

of ill fame resorted to for the pur-

pose of prostitution or lewdness;

or wilfully receiving for such house

or resorted thereto for lewdness;

Second, Who is the owner of any

building or tenement, the whole or

any part of which is used for any

of the purposes mentioned in the

first subdivision of this section; or

has control of such building or tenement

as agent, guardian, or lessee of

such owner, or as the agent of

such guardian or lessee, and after

notice of such improper use of such

building or tenement, shall fail to

suppress the same by removing

therefrom the occupants thereof;

or Third, Who lets any building or

tenement knowing that the lessee

intends using the same, or any part

thereof, for any of the purposes

mentioned in the first subdivision

of this section, shall be liable to

about his or her private premises

anywhere, tramp or

wildly following a few courses

of life therein;

Shall be liable, for such offense,

to a fine in any sum not exceeding

ninety-nine dollars, or to impris-

onment for any term not exceed-

ing one hundred days; or to both

such fine and imprisonment.

Sec. 2.—Who shall be liable, on the

trial of any person charged with

either of the offenses named in the

preceding section, for the prosecu-

tion to introduce evidence of such

character and reputation of the

person or place, touching the of-

fense, shall be liable to a fine

of not less than \$100, nor more

than \$500, for each offense.

Sec. 3.—Let prosecutions under the

second subdivision of Section one

of this ordinance shall be a suffi-

cient defense if the defendant

shows that he has been dili-

gently using the power which the

law gives him to suppress the im-

proper use of the building or tenement

concerning which the charge is

made.

Sec. 4.—That Chapter forty-four

of the Revised Ordinances of Salt

Lake City, passed July 20th, 1875,
