LOCAL BRIEFS.

Election Thursday—The Street Car union will elect officers next Thursday, the Australian ballot being used.

Remmon Tomorrow—The Scandinavian State will hold a remmon tomorrow at 2 p. m., in the Granite state tabernacle, with music furnished by the choir of the Salt Lake stake.

Ordained to Ministry—J. Knox Bodel, formerly of this city, and now a resident of San Mateo, Cal., was ordained to the ministry the other day by Bishop Spalding, and will be stationed at Montrose, Colo.

Arranging Program—The O. A. R. Spaulding War Veterans, and W. R. C. committees, on arrangement for the outing at Lagoona on the 25th inst., will meet this evening, in Odd Fellows hall, to complete the program.
