

and provisions to be transhipped by the yacht to different points. The United States ship *Alaska* has gone to Mare Island presumably to land her armament and ship supplies, stores, etc., with a view of acting as tender.

SUTRO, Nev., 30.—To-night the mountain tops overlooking the Washoe silver region and the Carson Valley are ablaze with bonfires, and the echoes of cannon and discharges of giant powder are heard in every direction. The event which is being celebrated is the final completion of the Sutro tunnel, for the reception of the water from the Comstock mines, after ten years of ceaseless labor day and night, and the expenditure of \$6,000,000.

The powerful engines of the combination shaft of the Hale & Norcross and Savage mines were started up this morning at precisely 6 o'clock, discharging their water into the Sutro Tunnel, at the mouth of which it made its appearance in one hour and twenty minutes, showing a temperature at first of 101 degrees, which gradually increased to 118 degrees in eight hours.

The water in the long drowned out mines was lowered 100 feet. Everything worked to a charm. The wooden boxes were constructed of three-inch tongued and grooved Sierra Nevada pine. It did not show a leak, and not even a particle of steam escaped them, so the tunnel, after the hot water was turned, showed barely an increase of temperature.

The water from the Sierra Nevada, the Union, the Ophir and the Bonanza mines, Best & Belcher and Gould & Curry, will not be turned in for a couple of weeks, after all finds its way into the tunnel. It is expected that one of the double line of boxes will have ample capacity to carry off the water.

As an engineering work the success surpasses all expectations, and while the people are rejoicing, this must be considered the proudest day in the life of Adolph Sutro.

#### FOREIGN.

LONDON, 28.—Advices from Capetown to the 10th of June state that according to an official account the Prince Imperial, after the surprise of his reconnoitering party, rode into a ravine, where a second body of Zulus lay concealed. The body will be conveyed to England in the troop ship *Orontes*.

General Newdigates column has advanced to Selef River, twenty miles beyond Blood River, where an entrenchment will be formed. General Crealock's command will leave for Fort Chelmsford tomorrow. His division will then advance and establish a cache at Fort Dumford, thus obtaining supplies by sea. The gunboat *Forester* will start for Fort Dumford immediately. Adjutant Frith, of Lancor, was killed in a skirmish.

The yeomanry have again unsuccessfully attacked Molosis Mountain in Bausto land, losing two men killed and twelve wounded.

Sir Bartle Frere has arrived at Capetown; where he was enthusiastically received.

LONDON, 30.—The Spanish frigate *Almansa* and the war steamer *Jorge Juan* have received orders to leave Havana for San Domingo, to support the demands of the Spanish Consul at Puerto Plata.

It is said that England and France will not accept the Sultan's abrogation of Irade of '41, which authorized the Khedive to conclude treaties with foreign powers and maintain an army.

The Russian Minister of the Interior has ordered the local authorities to take measures against agitators inciting the peasants to disturbance by spreading false reports of the impending redistribution of lands.

Great distress is reported in the west of Ireland, on account of the continued rains.

The *Standard* has the following, under date of Durban, June 9. The coffin containing the remains of the Prince Imperial, on the arrival at Pieter Maritzburg, was wrapped in the French colors, the Prince's sword and helmet were placed thereon and his horse was lead after it. In a skirmish in which Adjutant Frith of the lancers was killed, the enemy numbered 11,500, and were repulsed by the cavalry, many being killed.

More peace messengers have come into Lord Chelmsford. The messengers were informed of the additional terms of peace, which

are: The King's regiment to disarm, Cetewayo not to assemble an army for five years, the King to pay a fine of two bullocks for every male Zulu, considerable portion of the cattle are to be distributed to the chiefs who surrendered to the English, and an English resident to be placed at Ulundi. The terms have not yet been answered.

A News dispatch from Lower Tugula, June 10, says: Three of the peace messengers declare that any terms will be acceptable.

A special dispatch dated Tierraritzburg, June 9, announces that the peace messengers have returned to Cetewayo. Virtually there is a fortnight's armistice.

Nearly all the special dispatches to the London newspapers from the Cape agree in pronouncing the peace overtures bona fide.

A Candahar dispatch says cholera is spreading in the villages of Quetah district. The returning troops suffered much from the disease.

The Times Cairo dispatch is positive Ismail Pasha will go to Smyrna.

A Paris dispatch states the editor of the *Triboulet* has been sentenced to six months imprisonment and 2,000 francs fine for caricaturing President Grevy; Ministers Terry and Lepere and M. Gambetta.

Crops in all parts of France have been injured by the rains.

A Berlin correspondent reports there is a mysterious coolness between Russia and Germany, and the Czar in consequence of it will not visit the empire.
