

HOUSE OF LORDS AGAINST COMMONS

Loreburn, Lord High Chancellor,
Makes Statement That Startles
Liberal Members of House.

LIBERALS WON'T TAKE OFFICE

Unless Crown Will Pledge Enough
Peers Will Be Appointed to Carry
Financial Measures.

London, Nov. 22.—"It is my opinion that it is impossible that any Liberal government can ever again bear the heavy burden of office, unless it is secured against a repetition of treatment such as other measures had to undergo for the last four years."

This sensational declaration by Lord Loreburn, lord high chancellor, in the debate on the budget in the house of lords today, had an electrical effect upon Liberal members of the house of commons who crowded the galleries.

Quitting the gallery they surged into the lobby under the conviction that they had heard the government's last word before the general election; that Premier Asquith will make a similar declaration in the house of commons next week, and that the long-delayed campaign against the lords has now begun in earnest.

statement could only mean that no Liberal leader henceforth will accept office, unless he receives a pledge from the crown that enough peers will be appointed on the premier's nomination to secure the house of commons against interference from the house of lords in financial matters.

After the Earl of Crewe, lord of the privy seal, had formally moved the second reading of the budget bill, without comment, Lord Lansdowne, leader of the opposition, immediately moved its rejection. He quoted precedents to show that, although the house of lords could not amend a finance bill, it had full right to discuss it and to throw it out, if it so wished. Besides, the present bill, he argued, had tucked to it legislation such as land taxation and increased license duties which the lords already had rejected, and which had been placed in the bill to oust the lords from their legitimate opportunity of dealing with the measures.

What, he asked, was to prevent home rule from being introduced in the finance bill? There was no limit to such abuses. The Unionists opposed license duties because they were crushing in their severity; the same applied to the land taxes.

The people, he said, not having been consulted, the peers had a clear duty not to decree the final extinction of the bill, but to insist that, before it becomes law, the country should be allowed an expression of opinion. The lords had carefully considered consequences of the rejection of the bill and were ready to face them.

Lord Loreburn replied, contending that there was nothing in the bill forcing a finance with the house of commons had the exclusive right to deal.

The attempt of the lords to interfere, he declared, was the beginning of a system that would lead to constitutional revolution. What was embodied in the bill was not new, either in the United States or Germany, and had been approved, not only by the present, but by the late house of commons.

After the lord high chancellor, many peers addressed the public, but interest waned. The Duke of Norfolk, who supported Lord Lansdowne's resolution, confessed that the lords had a serious problem to face, but that it should not daunt them in performing their duty.

ALMA BELL TELLS STORY OF KILLING

Auburn, Cal. Nov. 22.—Testifying in her own behalf today, Alma Bell, the girl on trial for the murder of Joe Arnes, told the story of her relations with Arnes, covering a period of two years, and their tragic sequel on June 5 last, when she shot her lover to death because of his refusal to keep an alleged promise to marry her.

She said that her engagement with Arnes had never been broken, but that he had repeatedly put off the promised marriage ceremony. Finally, a few days before the homicide, he had definitely cast her off, basing his action on rumors that had reached him, connecting her name with those of other men.

The witness denied that she had worn a revolver strapped to her knee, or made threats against Arnes prior to the tragedy.

LEMON GROWERS WIN THE FIRST POINT

Los Angeles, Nov. 22.—The lemon growers of southern California won the first point in the contest with the railroads to prevent a raise in the freight rates on lemons when Judge William I. Morrow, in the U. S. circuit court, overruled today the demurrers interposed by the railroad companies.

The lemon growers seek to enjoin the railroads from putting the proposed raise on lemon rates into effect, and the hearing today was on an application to make the temporary injunction permanent. The railroads demurred on the ground that the court was without jurisdiction.

Judge Morrow asked some pointed questions of T. J. Norton of Chicago, counsel for the Santa Fe.

"Would Congress," he asked, "have increased the tariff on lemons had it known that part of it would go to the railroads?"

Mr. Norton did not quite understand, "Isn't it a fact," insisted the judge, "that duties are made for the benefit of producers?"

"That's the theory," said Mr. Norton.

The judge then repeated his original question.

"I presume it would if Congress had been advised of all the facts," replied Mr. Norton.

"I don't think so, Mr. Norton," said the court.

GOMPERS PAYS HIS RESPECTS TO LAWYERS

New York, Nov. 22.—Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, paid his respects to the legal profession today at the opening session of the National Civic Federation's annual meeting. He was discussing the need in this country of new laws to cover the subject of employers' liability and to provide adequate compensation to wage-earners injured by accidents.

"Lawyers will prevent our getting the best and the wisest laws in the matter," he said. "They will have little difficulty in finding almost insurmountable constitutional objections to the resources of our constitutional lawyers for interpretation are limited, particularly when they are superinduced by the opportunity for well-served fees."

"All we can hope for is a little progress. We must go on with our work or spreading the light. For the good of the country, we must establish some semblance of the justice which is demanded by such disasters as this most recent one at Cherry, Ill."

John Mitchell also spoke, saying that conditions of mining in this country are more safe than in Europe, but that nearly five men out of every thousand employed are killed annually, whereas, in Belgium England and Germany the average is one to a thousand. He said the laws should protect workers more adequately.

TO HELP HIS MOTHER.

Gallatin, O., Nov. 22.—That, as he said, his mother might get the reward, Edward Bachman, under indictment for burglary, confessed to Chief Henry Waldman of this city that he was guilty of a double murder committed in Guilford, Miss., in October, 1908. He said he shot and killed Policeman Lee Arnada and a bystander, who had been deputized by the officer to arrest Bachman.

Chief Waldman ascertained that the murders confessed by Bachman had been committed.
