COLORADO CURTAILMENT.

Further Reduction in Output Will Not Affect Dividend.

Affect Dividend. W. Lester Mangum, secretary of the Colorado Mining company, is authority for the statement that the output of that company is to be curtailed fur-ther, but that the rumor of a com-plete shutdown is unfounded. After a conference with one of the local smelting companies' manager on Saturday afternoon, it was announced that the mine's production for the time being would be limited to 30 cars monthly; whereas the output heretofore has been around 40 car loads. The reduction, Mr. Mangum says, will not interfere with the payment of the regular dividend.
