CULLED FROM LATEST EXCHANGES.

The Charlotte Thompson troupe perform in Ogden this evening.

The small fruit crop in Box Elder County has turned out well this year.

A Logan poulturer claims to have set a hen on 12 eggs which hatched out 14 chickens.

The Ogden City Council has declared against holding public funerals over victims of scarlet fever.

Logan River has been flooding some portions of the Island and has submerged a part of the county road leading into the city, damaging gardens, etc., to a considerable extent.

The Sabbath schools of Wellsville, Mendon, Paradise, Hyrum and West Millville, united in a Sunday School Union in the meeting-house in Wellsville, yesterday. The exercises occupied morning and afternoon.

At Yellow Creek, Wyoming, on the 22nd inst., two Indians quarrelled over a young and pretty squaw. They had been indulging in too much whisky and felt full of jealousy and fight. One shot the other three times, killing him instantly, and then made his escape, although friends of the murdered man are on his track.

Bear River is also enjoying a boom. A new bridge at Meyer's Crossing, about twelve miles from Evanston, was washed away a few days ago and in that city great damage has been done through the floating off of frame buildings and the tearing away of the levees, etc. At last accounts the stream was slowly subsiding.

By the breaking in two of a freight train on the Utah and Northern on the 25th inst., near Glen Hill, Montana, some of the cars, which could not be controlled by the brakes, were ditched. In the disaster Conductor Edwards was killed and a brakeman named Sayles was badly hurt. It now appears that the trainman Edwards killed about two weeks ago by an attack of Cole's circus, is a brother of the conductor killed in this accident.

The "Fourth" will be celebrated in Logan in grand style. The programme of exercises includes reading of the Declaration, Oration, by Hon. B. F. Cummings, jr. Responses to toasts from Hon. Moses Thatcher, C. W. Nibley, Esq., and others, singing by the choir and Sunday Schools and music by the bands. The procession is to be directed by O. C. Ormsby, Esq., and Hon. R. S. Campbell will act as Master of Ceremonies in the Tabernacle. In the afternoon a free dance for children and sports and athletic exercises for those so inclined; and in the evening a grand ball in the grove and a display of fireworks, the first of the kind ever given in Logan.


