OIL IN WYOMING. Much Interest Taken in the Field Near Byron.

Much interest is being manifested in the oil district near Byron, Wyo, where many Utah peope are interested. A Byron paper says: The people of this locality are very much encouraged over the oil outlook at the present time. The Wyoming & Montana Oil Co. has brought in a well that is a sure enough gusher, as

well that is a sure enough gusher, as it throws oil fully 100 feet above tha surface. Three other large outfits are now on the ground and various other interests have experts here watching operations and staking out new claims.

Prof. Samuel Aughey, a geologist of International reputation, who was here recently to examine the Byron oil field, has this to say of the district: has this to say of the district: "After going over a part of this field again and seeing the confirmation of my first report, the conclusion reached is that the Byron is one of the great high grade illuminating oil fields, but none that yield so high a grade of oil." While the present developed of the

fields, but none that yield so high a grade of oil." While the present developed field is comparatively small, the consensus of opinion of the experts is that the field extends from Bonanza, Wyo, on the south, through the vicinity of Grey Bull and Byron to a point a short distance south of Bridger, Mont., and it now looks like this entire district will be staked out in oil claims within the next sixty days, as surveying parties and locators are to be seen in several parts of the district. The Barnsdall people have already taken up and leased about 9.000 acres. The Bateson, Oklahoma, firms have leased some 2,600 acres and have a modern drilling outfit working day and night. The Miles City company is putting down a well just half a mile north of Byron, and an Indiana firm has shipped eight cars of modern drill-ing machinery to be used in testing some 2,000 acres of leased locations that were located by local people. At the the recent wonderful strike of oil in the Wood & Downey wells, he says, has given new life to that field, and is attracting the attention of capitalists all over the country. The future of southern Utah is as-sured, for the permanency of the oil field is proven beyond a doubt, which, together with the coal, copper, silver, gold, iron and other resources of Utah. "Dixie" is bound to come into greater prominence. A railroad from Lund to Cedar and Harmony coal mines, will some 2,000 acres of leased locations that were located by local people.
