Considerable excitement was caused, this morning, by the announcement of the failure of John Bonner & Co., one of the oldest houses oo the street. The firm has made an assignment to B. W. Grisweld. It is said that the firm ursued the same methods charged against Netter & Co., rehypotheca-tion of securities. Their liabilities are said to be quite heavy, and several prominent speculators are mentioned as considerable losers. Intelligence of the failure has had a depressing effect on the stock market, and some of the leading shares are down one per cent. How It was Done.

The Post says, of the Bonner Co. collapse, Bonner bought all the fon Carles Expulsion from France stock of the Bankers' and Brokers' manager to pay for it out of the funds of the Association, and then took the stock and borrowed on it. He bid 35 for the stock on Saturday, and borrowed \$25,000 on \$100,000 of it.
