A dispatch from Bremen states the number killed by the dynamite explosion to be fifty-seven, and thirty-three wounded. A trunk, containing fifteen million in bonds, was stolen from an express car in New York, on Saturday night.

Charged to the Jury.

By Chief Justice White, in the case of the U. S. v. George, indicted for kidnapping, tried in the Third District Court, Salt Lake City, Dec. 10, 1875.

While you consider of this case, you will find that it is not only a case of law, but a case of conscience. The defendant is charged with kidnapping, a crime which is not only against the law, but against the conscience of every man.

The first thing, then, to consider is whether the defendant was married at the time of the crime. The evidence shows that he was not married at the time, and therefore his crime is not one of bigamy.

What is the nature of the crime? It is a crime against the law, and a crime against the conscience of every man. The defendant is charged with kidnapping, a crime which is not only against the law, but against the conscience of every man.

But, gentlemen, it is said that to constitute the crime it is necessary that there should have been a criminal intent, and it is urged upon you with much plausibility and matchless force, that under the provisions of the law, you cannot find the defendant to have been guilty of the crime.
