City Council.—Meeting of the City Council, Tuesday evening, Oct. 1st, 1875, Mayor Little, presiding.

A petition was presented from Barratt Brothers, asking for an auctioneer's license for one year from October 1, 1875. Granted.

The special committee, to whom was referred the matter of inspecting the wooden building on First South Street, belonging to C. E. Stofle, which was dilapidated, reported that they had examined the building and concluded that it was entirely too dangerous for occupancy, and could not be made habitable unless torn down and rebuilt from the foundation. Report adopted.

The petition of Isaac Hunter claiming compensation for damages sustained by his wife in 1862 and 1863, which was laid over for one week to be taken up and considered with the former report in relation to the same matter, came up for consideration.

Our correspondent informs us that a child of his, aged 14, was reduced to a mere skeleton after three weeks ago, but by the use of this remedy, she was now well.

After consideration by the council it was voted that the prayer of the petitioner be not granted.

Museum.—Several valuable Indian curiosities consisting of stone heads, spear-heads, coils and pettles have been presented to the department of Ethnology by Hon. Charles C. Rich. Some Indian relics, consisting of crania and human remains, found in this city, fragments of pottery and other Indian curiosities, from Southern Utah, have been added to the same department by Mark Lindsey, Esq. and a silver coin of James 1st, of England, has been presented to the coin collection by Edward Faulkner, of Brigham City. Fossils remains of the bull and other large animals, have been added to the cabinets of the Desert Museum by the Y. M. M. Society of St. Johns, under the direction of Brother E. L. Stockey of that settlement.

Accident.—From the Junction we learn of a painful accident which occurred in Huntsville, on Saturday last.

John H. Hale, of that settlement, while in the act of using the grinding cylinder of a threshing machine in operation, had his left hand caught between the tongs, and his arm was drawn in, the whole fleshy part being terribly lacerated.

If the men in charge had not exerted sufficient degrees of mind to enable them to stop the machine instantly, he would have been torn to pieces. Considering the severity of the accident, he is doing remarkably well at present.

Bass Ball.—The base ball game yesterday, played in aid of Barker, did not draw as large an audience as was expected. It was very well played, and was won by the Red Stockings—score 12 to 8.
