

JURY SECURED TO TRY LAMPHERE

He is Charged With the Murder
Of Mrs. Belle Guinness and
Her Three Children.

PROSECUTION IS CONFIDENT

All it Will be Necessary to Show is
That Defendant Set Fire to House
And Occupants Perished in It.

Laporte, Ind., Nov. 12.—The introduction of evidence in the trial of Ray Lamphere, for the murder of Mrs. Belle Guinness and her three children, by setting fire to the house, will begin tomorrow morning, a jury having been secured late this afternoon, and State's Atty. Smith having made his opening statement to the jury before the adjournment of court.

Prosecutor Smith's opening statement to the jury consumed an hour, and in it he went into much detail as to what he could prove. Atty. Lamphere's defense, which provides that where a person or persons lose their lives in a fire willfully started by another, even though he may not have intended to cause the death of the persons or persons, it becomes murder in the first degree and is punishable by death or life imprisonment. Prosecutor Smith stated:

"All we are required to show is that the defendant set fire to the house and that these occupants lost their lives by reason of this act."

Mr. Smith said that the evidence will show that Lamphere made remarks to various persons indicating his hatred for Mrs. Guinness and his intention to do her harm, including statements that he knew how to get money from her. The fear that Mrs. Guinness felt for Lamphere was touched on, and then the prosecutor took up the story of the night of the fire and what the state would prove. He said that the Lamphere's own statement it would be proven that he set the alarm clock at Mr. Smith's house, where he spent the night, for 2 o'clock in the morning of April 13, and that he was on the spot when the fire broke out, about 4 o'clock, and that he was the only person around at that time. We will prove that he was at Lake Erie crossing at 4:50 a. m. This is a mile and a quarter away. We will show that instead of going on the highway Lamphere jumped over fences and ran along through the woods to John Pease's place, where he was going to get a broadsword, before continuing to the Henry Warwick place, where he was employed. We will show by the evidence that when he was arrested that night by Deputy Sheriff Ames and Marr that the first thing he said was: "Did those folks get out of the house?" So you see the thought foremost in his mind was the burning of that house."

The prosecutor then took up the events of the day and evening preceding the fire, so far as they concerned Mrs. Guinness, and told of her visit to Atty. Lellier's office for the purpose of making her will, and of her expressed fears of Lamphere. The prosecutor told of her purchases of groceries and toys, games, etc., for the children. He said that by Joseph Maxson, the hired man, it would be proven that all had supper about 7 o'clock and that among other things they had beefsteak, and "my reason for mentioning this," observed Mr. Smith, "will develop when the evidence is offered."

The state's attorney said that Maxson will then tell of seeing Mrs. Guinness and the children playing with new guns on the dining room table as he went to bed in his room about 9:30 o'clock.

Continuing, he said that the state would prove that Mrs. Guinness and her 5-year-old son, Philip, slept in a bed in the northeast corner on the second floor, and that the two girls slept in a room in the southwest corner, that the fire was started in the southwest corner and was driven toward the north by the wind; that Mrs. Guinness and the boy were overcome, and that later, when the fire entered the girls' room, they ran into their mother's room, thereby getting into the hottest of the flames and going down with their mother and brother.

"We will also prove," said Mr. Smith, "that when the bodies were found there was a foot of debris underneath mattresses, bed springs, etc., showing that those bodies could not have been endeavoring to place on the cement floor of the basement."

The juryman were not allowed to separate after they had been sworn in and will be kept together until the verdict has been returned. Quarters have been prepared for them on the third floor of the courthouse, where they will be under the care of a bailiff. Meals will be eaten at a table in the introduction of evidence will begin tomorrow morning, Coroner Mack being the first witness to be called.

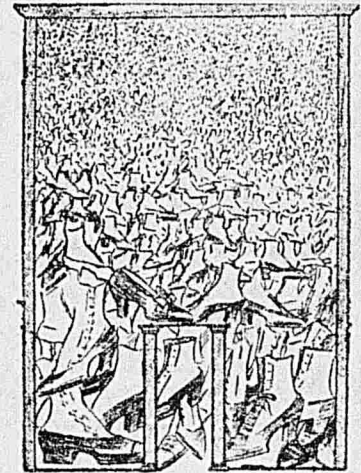
