Prosperous Farming Season-Experiments in Farm Drainage.

Huntington, Emery Co., Nov. 25.-The Inst week has been a very wet one. There is plenty of land and water here now for a great many more settlers, and if new coal camps open up there will be opportuni-ties for thousands of new settlers, as there is plenty of land, and water can be stored to irrigate it.
