SYMMES' HOLE.

The Undiscovered World in the Interior of the Earth.

A little more than half a century ago, John Cleves Symmes, then a captain in the regular army of the United States, with headquarters at New York, became impressed with the idea that the earth was hollow, and habitable within as without. He devoted all his spare moments to the study of philosophy, and in 1816, while stationed at St. Louis, made known his theory of the earth by means of circulars first, and then through the press of that city.

The theory was then talked about considerably. Captain Symmes concluded to devote the remainder of his life to the realization of his theory, and for this purpose resigned his position in the army. His next step was to make known his theory to the world. This he strove to do by traveling through the country, principally, however, in the Middle and Eastern States.
