

BY TELEGRAPH. FOREIGN.

LONDON, 29.—The case of Jean Luie, the claimants' witness in the Tichborne trial, charged with perjury, again came up at Bow street police court to-day; Geo. H. Whalley, member of Parliament, who maintained the truth of Luie's statements, was examined.

Lieut. General Henry J. French, of the British army, and Lord of St. John of Bledsoe, is dead.

Odger is candidate for Parliament in Southwark. To-night his friends in large numbers entered the hall where a conservative meeting was in progress, took forcible possession of the platform and dispersed the assemblage. The conservative candidate, Abingdon, was mobbed and stoned.

Roebuck addressed a large meeting at Sheffield this evening, he spoke in favor of compulsory education.

Butt, the home rule leader, contests the election in Manchester.

In the Tichborne trial, to-day, Chief Justice Cockburn commenced his charge to the jury.

The trial of Jean Luie has been adjourned, and the defendant remanded until the end of the Tichborne case, in order that the claimants' testimony may be available.

ZURICH, 29.—Field marshal Baron Von Goblenz, of Austria, committed suicide here to-day.

HAVANA, 31.—A letter says a number of families of Cubans in the field have been brought from Gobarra, Bolguin, Porte Principe and other cities of the Central and Eastern departments, and imprisoned by the authorities. It is a piteous spectacle to see the slow procession of feeble old men, hollowed-eyed women, some with babies in their arms, and troops of little children, carrying, some of them, immense bundles, making their way over the rough streets to jail. The prisoners, to the number of 200, were sent afterwards to the Isle of Pines. The greater part were sent from Puerto Principe by Gen. Portillo, who describes them as *vecinos peligrosos*, dangerous neighbors.

LONDON, 30.—The nomination of Members of Parliament began to-day. Bright, Dixon and Munzt, the former members, are returned from Birmingham without opposition; Karslake is returned from Huntingdon, and Col. Clive, Conservative, from Frome. The Liberals did not attempt to contest the latter borough, which has been represented for the last five years by Thos. Hughes. Dispatches received up to midnight show seven Liberals and ten Conservatives returned, the conservatives gaining one member at Frome. Dr. Butt has retired from the contest at Manchester and Nolen from that at Greenwich.

BERLIN, 30.—The *North German Gazette*, alluding to the sympathy manifested in Belgium for the ultramontanes, declares that every government is bound to check the disposition of its subjects to participate in revolutionary attempts against friendly powers.

LONDON, 31.—Several of the city candidates addressed their constituents to-night. Baron Rothschild declared that it was his opinion that Gladstone's promised remission of taxes would involve a loss of nine million sterling to the revenue. He suggests that the deficiency be met by a system of licence for all persons engaged in trade and commerce.

Goschen declared himself in favor of the integrity of the empire, by which he meant no home rule and the maintenance of the present relations with the colonies. He hoped the Ashantee war would not cost over one million pounds. He favored the advancement of the working classes by education and the removal of burdensome taxation, but he was opposed to the government providing employment for them in times of scarcity, because such relief would sap the spirit of independence.

A dispatch from Cape Coast Castle states that twelve Ambassadors from the Ashantees recently arrived in the British camp, suing for peace. Sir Garnet Wolseley replied that he would only treat with the King himself at Comassie.

The Liberals have carried Maidstone, electing both their candidates; a Conservative was returned from Bewdley in Worcestershire, and a home rule candidate from Carlow, Ireland.

The report from Paris, that Bismarck had written to the British Government, relative to the attitude of the Ultramontane press and Roman Catholic Bishops, is contradicted.

It is reported that Gen. Wolseley has detained the Ashantee Ambassadors as hostages for some British sailors taken prisoners by the enemy.

THE HAGUE, 31.—A dispatch from Padang reports that the cholera has broken out in Acheen, that the Sultan has died of it, and that the war is virtually over.

CONSTANTINOPLE, 2.—A fire here, last night, destroyed one hundred houses, including the residence of the grand Vizer.
