LOCAL BRIEFS.

The Congregation Montefiore will give a bath, Dec. 15, in Assembly hall, to raise funds for paying off the mortgage on the synagogue.

Thirty-five "rookies" arrived yesterday afternoon from Angel Island, Cal., as recruits for the Twenty-ninth Infantry, at Fort Douglas.

A meeting of parents will be held at the Franklin school on Thursday afternoon when Judge Brown of the juvenile court will deliver my address.

H. E. Jenkins has bought from W. F. Garrison for \$2,000, 9x12½ rods at Eighth West and Eleventh South streets, and a five-room brick dwelling.

Plastering has been stopped for the season in the Catholic cathedral, on account of the frost, to be resumed with the return of settled weather in the spring.

L. C. Grover, assistant hydrographer of the reclamation service, is in town for a few days looking after facts connected with the gauging of the streams of U. S. state.

The Real Estate association will meet tomorrow evening, to discuss ways and means for boosting the town, with a view to bringing people and industries here to locate.

Miss Martha Reed, daughter of Gen. Sept. Read of the street railway, will be home tomorrow, after an absence in Europe of three years and eight months, studying music.

The La. D. S. normals visited the V. M. C. A. building yesterday, to write the institution up, as a composition exercise. The association scored its thousand and first member yesterday.

Mrs. Lulabell E. Carlson gave a piano recital last evening, in Beesley's hall on Main street, assisted by Miss Edith Kingsbury and Miss Lillian Hulsen. The function was a pleasing success.

Major Myton said today it was his belief that Fort Duchesne will be abandoned, notwithstanding any opposition that may be made to the move. The major says it is a very expensive post, and that there is no longer any real occasion for its continuance.

George T. Odell made a trip the other evening, from this city to Brigham City, 61 miles, in the automobile formerly owned by T. M. Schumacher, thence to Pocatello, 155 miles, passing Logan, Preston and Oxford, and on to Idaho Falls and Indian Farms, with five people, making in all 231 miles, between 4 p. m. Wednesday, and noon on Friday.

The biennial report of the state engineer's office for the years 1903-04 has been filed with Gov. Cutler by State Engineer Tanner. It contains about 100 pages of detailed maps and also has a number of pictures and illustrations of the various water and irrigation systems of the state. It gives in detail the work done by the engineering department the past two years.

A piece of vandalism was perpetrated recently by an automobile delivery wagon exhibited at the Pure Food show by the Consolidated Wagon & Machine company. It was found, when the company's employees came to remove the vehicle, that some person familiar with automobiles had removed the battery box by taking out some half dozen screws, then, using his wire nippers, had cut off the electrical connection.

The fourth biennial report of the state engineer to the governor of Utah has been printed and published in pamphlet form from the Deseret News establishment, and is now ready for distribution from the office of the state engineer. The pamphlet is very neatly arranged and handsomely illustrated with numerous half-tones and photographs of the various points of interest in and out of the city. This scheme is part of a unique system of advertising operated by a company which had twenty cities on its list, and the Commercial club has a three-year contract with the company. The views are changed by an electric motor, automatically.

Five new cars are expected here daily for the street rallyay service. They are 32 feet over all, in length, and will carry 40 passengers. The interior arrangement is different from the type commonly used here, in that the seats are either in the form of longitudinal, while six seats on either side in the center are crosswise. This is done to facilitate egress and exit, as it is found that the extension of the cross seats through the car hinders free movement at the doors. The cars will weigh about 15 tons each.

The principals of the Salt Lake schools have organized to take extension work under professors of the University of Utah, the work to be given on Saturdays, and to consist of courses professionally valuable to city principals. English under Prof. Reynolds, biology under Prof. Chamberlain, and sociology under Prof. Coray are the courses scheduled. The principals will register at University students to receive instruction under an extension plan originally inaugurated at the University of Chicago.

Edwin G. Raymond of the Salt Lake office of the Law Co., died at St. Mary's hospital in Pueblo, Colorado, yesterday, of typhoid fever. He had gone there to deliver copies of the new city directory, which were printed in the establishment of the Deseret Evening News, and contracted the disease. Mr. Raymond was a member of the Masonic Lodge of Masons of this city, and his remains will be brought here for burial under the auspices of the lodge. He was 31 years old, and a native of Stowe, Vt., where his parents still reside.
