LOCAL BRIEFS.

The Congregation Montefiore will give a ball, Dec. 11, in Armory hall, to raise funds for paying off the mortgage on the synagogue.

Thirty-five "rookies" arrived yesterday afternoon from Angel Island, Cal., as recruits for the Twenty-ninth Infantry, at Fort Douglas.

A meeting of parents will be held at the High School on Thursday afternoon when Judge Brown of the juvenile court will deliver an address.

H. E. Jenkins has bought from W. F. Garrison for \$3,000, 912 1/2 rods at Eighth West and Eighth South streets, and a five-room brick dwelling.

Plastering has been stopped for the season in the Catholic cathedral, on account of the frost, to be resumed with the return of settled weather in the spring.

L. C. Graver, assistant hydrographer of the oceanographic service, is in town for a few days looking after facts connected with the gauging of the streams of the state.

The Real Estate association will meet tomorrow evening, to discuss ways and means for boosting the town, with a view to bringing people and industries here to locate.

Miss Martha Reed, daughter of Gen. Supt. Reed of the street railway, will be home tomorrow, after an absence in Europe of three years and eight months, studying music.

The L. D. S. normals visited the Y. M. C. A. building yesterday, to write the institution up, as a composition exercise. The teaming in all 23 miles, its thousand and first member yesterday.

The fourth biennial report of the state engineer's office for the years 1903-04 has been filed with Gov. Cutler by State Engineer Tanner. It contains about 100 pages of printed matter, and has a number of pictures and illustrations of the various water and irrigation systems of the state. It gives in detail the work done by the engineering department the past two years.

A piece of vandalism was perpetrated recently on the automobile delivery wagon exhibited at the Pure Food show by the Consolidated Wagon & Machine company. It was found, when the company's employees came to remove the vehicle, that some person familiar with automobiles had removed the battery, and taken out some half dozen screws, then, using his wire nippers, had cut off the electrical connection.

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The Commercial club will advertise the town by a kaleidoscope picture display, with electric lighting, at the corner of Second South and Main streets, the display being in the nature of views of the various points of interest in and out of the city. This scheme is part of a unique system of advertising operated by a company which had twenty cities on its list, and the Commercial club has a three years' contract with the company. The views are changed by an electric motor, automatically.

Five new cars are expected here daily for the street railway service. They are 30 feet over all in length, and will carry 40 passengers. The interior arrangement is different from the type commonly used here, in that the seats at either end of the car are lengthwise, while six seats on either side in the center are crosswise. This is done to facilitate getting on and off, as is found that the extension of the cross seats through the car hinders free movement at the doors. The cars will weigh about 18 tons each.

TAMPERS on Seventh South street from Second to Fifth West streets will petition the city council to make the contemplated sidewalk improvements in that section before snow flies. The tax is already due and payable and bears interest from Oct. 1, yet it has been done looking to the completion of the work in the immediate future. Some portions of the sidewalk have been rendered impassable through the dumping of refuse material, and property owners fear that unless the improvement is made immediately they will be forced to suffer serious inconvenience throughout the winter, at a time when the sidewalks at best are bad enough. Those who have not the tax feel outraged that they should be required to pay for something that may not be granted them for six months, hence the petition.
