

**Death of Mrs. Selma M. Rivett.**—This afternoon Mrs. M. M. Barrett, of the 12th Ward of this city, was the recipient of sad news. A cablegram conveyed to her the untimely information that her sister, Mrs. Selma Moorhouse Rivett, died at her residence, in Stockport, Manchester, England, on the 22d inst. Deceased was born Oct. 15th, 1835, and was baptized a member of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints in 1854. The intelligence of the death of this most excellent lady is not only a heavy blow to her sister, who held her in most tender affection, but her elder son, Mr. Joseph Rivett, now in this city on a visit to his aunt, is overwhelmed with grief at the tidings, which is also received with deep regret by many friends of the deceased in Utah.

The writer had the pleasure of a personal acquaintance with Mrs. Rivett, and knew her to be one of the most amiable and benevolent of her sex, many of the poor having been made the glad recipients of her bounty. Her faith in the Gospel as resting in this dispensation was unshaken, and her whole life was an exhibition of devotion to her religion. Her hospitality to the servants of God engaged in preaching the Gospel in England was proverbial, and the memory of her many acts of kindness will be cherished by many who had the pleasure of meeting her in life. She had a great desire to gather with the Saints in Utah, but circumstances were of such a character as to prevent the gratification of this wish. We deeply sympathize with her relatives in this city and elsewhere, knowing the strong bond of affection by which they were bound to our respected sister, who has gone to her rest, until called forth by the power of the resurrection to dwell in immortal bloom, as the reward of a well spent probation.

**The Free Delivery Business.**—In another column will be found a notice published by several leading lumber and wood-working firms in this city. It is to the effect that they purpose, on and after a specified time, to charge for delivery. Under the circumstances we scarcely see any room for complaint at this action on their part. The delivery business in this city is abused to an extent that is sometimes ludicrous, except in the eyes of those who are imposed upon. How convenient and comfortable it is for some person in the eastern part of the city to find a telephone and shout to an unfortunate lumber dealer near the western edge of town: "Send me immediately a piece of two by four inch scantling." The price of the article is probably 40 cents, and it costs the vendor about 50 cents to deliver it.

Every merchant on the street has some heart-rending story to tell of the abuse of the delivery business. Perhaps one has been requested with an air of innocence, to "send them two boxes of matches to my house." Another customer imperiously issues a peremptory mandate to deliver that ten cents worth of tape. A merchant not far down town tried to cure a woman given too much to this kind of business. She gave an order for some trifling article to be delivered at her house. The merchant hired a dray to carry the article to its destination, and got a couple of men to carry it from the wagon to the house with an appearance of great distress, as if staggering under the load. The lady looked on with serious countenance, but said not a word. Purchasers should have some show of mercy on merchants about delivering goods, and should at least make it a rule not to ask to have sent home any purchase the market value of which will severely cover the cost of carriage.

**"Hazel Kirke."**—"Hazel Kirke" drew an immense audience last night. It was played with the same perfection and spirit as on its first presentation here, and every character was portrayed in such a natural way that the play appeared like reality. Mr. Coullock preserves his dramatic powers to a wonderful degree. His impersonation of the old scholar, Miller, especially in the third act, was as lifelike as ever, and it is difficult to see wherein it could be improved. Coullock was always a favorite here and he was received with acclamation. All the other performers were excellent and none can be singled out for special notice where every actor is an artist. The pathos of the play drew frequent tears from the audience, and so intense was the interest that applause was not bestowed in many instances where it was well deserved. The play will be repeated to night, and those who wish to see it had better go early. It is rare that such a combination of talent as this appears as a traveling company.

**St. Mark's Hospital Benefit.**—Tomorrow night one of the musical and torchlight events of the season will come off at the Theatre. We hope to see the house crowded on the occasion, because of the noble character of the institution to be benefited by the proceeds of the entertainment—St. Mark's Hospital. The opportunity is presented of enjoying a genuine treat, and at the same time, performing an act of benevolence. The fact alone of the musical part of the programme being under the conductorship of Professor Careless is sufficient to warrant its being of a highly satisfactory class. Let the house overflow, and the unfortunate be benefited.

**The Coming Race.**—There was a well-attended meeting of the Salt Lake Bicycle Club yesterday evening. Two new candidates were admitted to membership, card dues of the members paid up to date, and seven entries registered for the race on the 30th inst. President Geo. J. Taylor, Vice-President McEllin, and Captain David, were appointed a committee on races. The conditions of the contest for the second medal were definitely arranged, and other business of the Club acted upon. Should the weather prove propitious there will undoubtedly be an interesting time at Calder's on Wednesday Day.

**The Bovine Business.**—The police officers, under the direction of Marshal Bart, have commenced the work of abating the wandering cow nuisance, about which so many citizens have been uttering emphatic complaints. All stray bovines found perambulating upon the streets are to be driven to the city pound.

In attending to this disagreeable duty the officers are necessarily subjected to a species of cross fire—one fusillade coming from those who complain of loose cattle breaking in to their lots, and the other from owners of the animals placed in the temporary custody of Mr. Shelton.

Let it be remembered in this connection, that should any cow be inadvertently taken by the officers which really does not reasonably come under the head of ordinance-breaking bovines, the matter can readily be adjusted by a little cool-headed explanation, by which most matters of an ordinary kind can be set right when slightly tried.

**Southern Conferences.**—Apostles Wilford Woodruff and Franklin D. Richards, returned yesterday from Sanpete, where they, together with Apostles F. M. Lyman and J. H. Smith, had been attending Stake Conference. The meetings, which were held in the new Stake Assembly Hall, at Mant, were well attended, and the time was interesting and profitably spent.

Elders Lyman and Smith proceeded farther southward, and one will attend Conference on Saturday and Sunday, at Richfield, and the other at Fillmore.

**Deceased.**—Among those who came to this city by the last company of emigrants from Europe was Brother John Gray, for several years President of the Glasgow, Scotland, branch of the Church, and well known to many of the Elders who have labored in that part of Britain. Since his arrival his little children have been more or less affected with sickness, which in the case of the youngest, a fine little fellow, sixteen months old, terminated in death, yesterday afternoon.

The funeral was to be conducted at 4 p.m., to-day, at Brother Gray's residence, in the 15th Ward.

**Attempted Brutal Outrage.**—Shortly before four o'clock this morning a woman who resides in a house immediately south of the Colorado House, in the 8th ward, appeared at the police office in a great excitement. She stated that a man had gained forcible entrance, by the window, to a room occupied by a young woman at her house, and, after locking the door on the inside, was attempting to violently commit an outrage on her person.

Officers A. Smith and W. Salmon were soon at the house and discovered that their informant had told the truth, but the brutal monster had, after a fruitless struggle to accomplish his diabolical purpose, fled the scene. Miss , who is a strongly built young woman, over twenty years of age, states that the struggle with her beastly assailant lasted over an hour, and when found by the officers she was in a state of great excitement and confusion combined. She asserts that if she had been armed she would have killed the fellow on the spot. He threatened to kill her, and she said she would die rather than sell. The officers at once set out to find the offender, and finally captured him in Hill and Trowella's saloon. His name is James Cassidy, a miner from Park City. The case was to be conducted in the police court at two o'clock this afternoon.
