innocent of wrongdoing, he still believ-ed that there was something wrong with the company. The last portion of the statement was incorrect. What Mr. McCornick meant and said was that he had never had any suspicions that there was any-thing wrong with the company and what he had learned since returning from Sar, Francisco Sunday momentor from San Francisco Sunday morning had confirmed him in this impression The omission to note the word "never" caused a belief in the mind of a "News" writer that Mr. McCornick had announced that he had had suspicions, and that these had been con-

firmed. Mr. McCornick was seen at his office Mr. McCornick was seen at his office this morning, but beyond making this correction, he did not wish to discuss the affairs of the company in further detail. He said that he regarded what he had already announced as sufficient for the present, and that he regretted that an impression had gone out to the effect that he had expressed a suspicion of the company or its president.

MAKING EFFORTS TO **RECONCILE CASTELLANES**

Paris, Feb. 7.-Strong efforts continue to be made in behalf of the Castellane family to bring about the abandonment of the divorce suit begun by the Countess Boni de Castellane, but up to the present the desired result has not been achieved. An attempt made to obtain the countess assent to a judicial expar-ation without an absolute divorce has ation without an absolute divorce has also been unsuccessful and probably the case will pursue the ordinary course, coming up for a hearing at no fixed date, but it is expected it will be heard three weeks hence. Accord-ing to the French law there is no fur-there necessity for the defendant to ap-pear unless the judge decides that his evidence is essential. The promounce-ment of a decree releases any contract relating to marriage settlement, each relating to marriage settlement, party resuming control of their own property. A divorced woman may not re-marry within 10 months after a judgment, while an appeal against a decision must be lodged within six months.

Mr. Patterson declared that the doc-trine that even states have a right to direct the votes of their senators has been abandoned. He endorsed the change of view holding that the free-dom of senators could not otherwise be maintained. He declared that the caucus rule did not provide for the caucus rule did not provide for the conscience of the senator and said that a senator should be true to his own convictions, constituting himself a wee. He appealed for relief from the "crueity and injustice and indefensible character of the caucus action." He said that the caucus was equiva-lent to declaring that senators was equiva-bent to declaring that senators was equiva-bent to declaring that senators who could not be secured through reason would be reached through fear. He said that a senator who stands in fear of being

reached through fear. He said that a senator who stands in fear of being weakened at the polls because of hav-ing violated caucus action has had his moral forces weakened. Deploring the use of such terms as "White House Democrats" and "insurgent Republi-cans" when independence was shown, he repeated that it was the duty of every senator regardless of party to vote his solemin convictions. As to the qualification that a senator should be 30 years of age, Mr. Patter-son quoted Judge Story that 30 years was not too long for due maturity and said that "tried integrity" was one qualification. He spoke of "taunts" having prassed back and forth across the chamber as to coercive measure and the chamber as to coercive measure and the chamber as to coercive measure and also spoke of summonses of senators to the White House. "I don't hesitate to say that the senators or member who surrenders his own convictions in the hope of patronage and that the presi-dent who promises it are, to say the least, to be condemned." he said, add-ing that such a course was nothing less than bribery. Such a course was im-moral and indefensive, and was the same as securing votes for venal con-siderations.
