Esq.:-My Dear Sir: On my return to Paris from Southern Italy on the 8th inst., I have learned (what I did not before believe) that my name may yet be presented to the National Conven-tion as a candidate for the Precidency of the republican party. A single phrase of my letter of January 25 from Florence (which was decisive of every-thing I had personal power to decide) has been treated by many of my most valued friends as not absolutely conclusive in ultimate and possible con-tingencies. On the other hand, friends equally devoted and disinterested have construed my letter as it should be construed, to be an unconditional

withdrawal of my name from the Na-tional Convention. They have in coa-sequence given their support to eminent gentlemen who are candidates for the Chicago nomination, some of whom would not, I am sure, have consented to assume that not.

I speak there-fore because I am not willing to re-main in a doubtful attitude. I am not willing to be the cause of misleading a single man among the millions who have given me their suffrage and their confidence. I am not willing that one confidence. I am not willing that one of my faithful supporters in the past should think me capable of paltering in a double sense with my words. Assuming that the Presidential nomination could, by possible chance be offered to me, I could not accept it without leaving in the minds of thousands of these men the impression that I had not been free from indirection I had not been free from indirection, and therefore I could not accept it at all. Misrepresentations of malice have no weight, but the just displeasure of friends, I could not patiently endure. A republican victory, the

prospects of which grow brighter every day, can be imperiled only by the lack of unity in council or by an acri-monious contest over men. The issue of protection is incalculably stronger and greater than any man, for it concerns the prosperity of the present and generations yet to come. Mr. Curtis' remarks in substance were devoted first to a comparison of the abuses of official patronage in England during the reign of the Stuarts and the present conditions under the system of reform. Second, to tracing the abuses of a similar character from Washington's administration up to the present time. He went on to say that the course of American history does not depend upon presidents, but upon the people. Of that fact even the managers of the nomi-

nating conventions are aware, and therefore, although they detest civil service reform and insist that it is ex-

service reform and insist that it is extinct, I venture to predict that one of the greatest conventions which will soon assemble will praise the President for his fidelity to reform and the other will denounce him as the chief of sinners against it, each party assuming not that reform is dead, but what is perfectly true, that it is more alive than ever before. Party platforms are valuable, not so much for what they say as for what they indicate.

He enunciated the reforms created by the league since its organization seven years since. Dwelling at length on the question of the eligibility of the President for a second term, he said it would be the coming work of the league to have enacted such a law which would at the same time extend the term to five years. He quoted Cleveland's letter of acceptance in 1884, in which the latter referred to the election of a President to be his own successor as a great danger to the people. Curtis, however, qualified those remarks as follows: "The tendency and temptation which in the mere prospectithe President depicts in these decisive and accurate words, actual experience has doubtless proved to him to be stronger and more seadnetive than he imagined."

THURMAN WILL ACCEPT. WASHINGTON, May 29 .- Allen W

Thurman, the son of ex-Senator Thur-

man, arrived last evening, it is under-stood he is here in response to suggestions from high quarters and that the ex-Senator will be second on the ticket with Cleveland. No doubt this is Cleveland's express wish. Governor Gray's boom for place on the ticket has gone to pieces. Allen G. Thurman will be the running mate to Cleveland this fall. Yesterday morning Allen W. Thurman arrived from Columbus with authority to state that his father would accept second place on the ticket provided the nomination was made unanimous. Secretary Whitney called on young Thurman early in the day and they were closeted toge her for over an hour. While neither of these gentlemen will talk, it having been agreed between them that it was best to keep the mat-ter quiet. Mr. Whitney was too much elated over the success of the project which emanated from his office in the Navy Department and told the result in confidence to a friend. When late in the afternoon Whitney was seen at the capitol and went into conference in the Senate Finance Committee room the object was easily ascertained. The other gentlemen to the conference were Bill Scott and Senator German. Whitney I learn stated authoritatively that the President wanted Thurman to be on the ticket with him and further related the result of the conference with young Thurman at the Ebbitt. When the conference was concluded it was with the understanding that Thurman

with the understanding that Thurman should be the man, each member of the conference pledging him their hearty support. The President was led into expressing his preference for Thurman because of the dangerous strength developed by Governor Gray. The latter's enemies brought out this "Know Nothing" charge which Mr. Cleveland investigated. As a result he gave it out that Gray must not be tacked on to out that Grav must not be tacked on to out that Gray must not be tacked on to the ticket if his name headed it. He agreed that the charge of Gray's having been a member of the "Know Nothing" party would lose the ticket in the State of New York. He was then called upon to name the man that could add strength to the ticket. He selected Thurman. This will be a hard blow to Pension Commissioner Black who up to ten days ago seemingly had

who up to ten days ago seemingly had the inside track. The Republicans here generally think that this will also ex-plode the Gresham boom, which has grown dangerously large within a few weeks. ENTHUSIASM FOR BLAINE.

My friends made my canvas with the thorough knewledge that I am for Mr. Blaine."

Why Edmunds is Silent. WASHINGTON, May 29 .- It was 'expected that Senator Edmunds who, by the resolution of the committee on foreign affairs reported on the fisheries treaty, would have it in charge during the debate, and the fact that the leadership had been practically taken by Senator Sherman, and that the voice of the Senator from Vermont was not heard upon the subject with which he is so familiar, in the colloquies which closed the afternoon's debate, caused some surprise. The explanation is understood to be that Senator Edmunds believes it to be impreper and unwise (to use no stronger terms) for the Senate, when in the act of advising the President, and especially upon an important matter of diplomacy, to do so in the presence of the public and the other party to the case. Though assenting relucvoting with his party for open doors, he is understood to prefer to take no public part in the proceedings, which he holds to be so irregular.

Sheridan's condition is reported as more favorable-A Bescription of his domicile.

WASHINGTON, May 29 -When General Sheridan came to Washington after his retirement his friends in Chicago were desirous of giving him a testimonial of their friendship and subscribed a sufficient sum of money to purchase him a suitable and com-fortable home. The house selected is situated on the northeast corner of Rhode Island Avenue and Seventeenth Rhode Island Avenue and Seventeenth street. It is a comfortable looking three-story pressed brick, with French roof. It has a large front porch, which is almost entirely covered with vines and on the west side the ivy reaches to the second story window. There are a number of bay windows and the house is unusually well lighted. The well-kept lawn extends to the pavement on both the Rhode Island Avenue and the Seventeenth street sides. General Seventeenth street sides. General Sheridan's room is in the southeast corner of the building with a double window opening on Rhode Island Avenue and another window opening into the side yard on the east. The parlor is a cosy room, giving a view of both streets. Just back of the parlor is a well-fitted library. Sheridan's home has always been one of unusual attraction to the people in the army and official circles. 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
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
