LOCAL BRIEFS.

First Day of Spring.—Today is the first day of spring, and while it is mild, it is misty, and the atmospheric surroundings are uninviting.

Edward Made Happy.—State Representative W. T. Edward was busy receiving the congratulations of his friends today, on the arrival at his home of a lively baby girl.

Application for Water.—J. W. Sawyer and E. G. & Co., of Elgin, Grand county, have filed application with the state engineer, for 12 second feet of water from the Green river, to irrigate 289 acres of land.

Purchased for \$10,000.—Finch, Rogers & Mulvey have purchased the three story building, Nos. 20 and 22 east Second South street, now occupied by them, for \$10,000. The ground belongs to another party, and is occupied on a 14 years lease.

Paper on Voltaire.—It will be ladies' night, Friday evening next, at the University club, when Rev. E. J. Goshen will read paper on Voltaire. Each member of the club is entitled to invite not to exceed three guests.

Won the Championship.—Charles H. McGurran of Kalamazoo, Mich., who won the championship yesterday, at Chicago, for fast type writing, is a brother of E. J. McGurran of this city, who himself is an artist in stenography and type writing.

Missionary Benefit.—At the Scandinavian meeting in the Fourteenth ward assembly rooms tomorrow (Thursday) evening, a musical program will be rendered, and contributions received for the benefit of missionaries laboring in Norway. All are invited.

Sale is Authorized.—The Westminster college corporation met last evening, and authorized the sale in Washington, D. C., of three lots belonging to the corporation, which will realize \$4,000. This money will be used in the erection of college buildings in this city.

Series of Lectures.—Dr. Benjamin F. Andrews, chancellor of Nebraska University, and formerly president of Brown University, and Dr. J. S. Hughes, superintendent of the Toronto, Canada, city schools, will deliver a series of lectures at the University summer school this year.

Dinner at "U."—This evening at the University club, Prof. Mitchell Carroll, head of the archaeology department of the George Washington university will be tendered a dinner, at which the Utah State Archaeological association will be the host. Tomorrow evening Prof. Carroll will lecture in the lecture hall of the Packard public library.

The Wasatch Drive.—President Quigley of the Commercial club will shortly call a meeting of those citizens having in charge the proposed Wasatch drive, with a view to beginning active operations. To the credit of the boulevard fund is in Walker's bank at present \$2,477.50, in the name of F. W. Francis, trustee, and there is considerable more subscribed.

Sale is Confirmed.—The transfer of the lease on the Cullen hotel and all of the furniture and fixtures belonging to the same has been confirmed by the district court and B. B. Heywood, the purchaser, will take charge of the hotel on Monday or as soon as the inventory of the property is completed. The property belongs to the estate of Samuel C. Ewing, who owned the hotel for years.

Want Some Changes.—The city council of Sandy considered last evening, the offer made by the municipality by the Utah Light and Railway company, and a committee of three, with W. W. Wilson as chairman, was appointed to confer with the company with reference to several changes desired in the proposed ordinance. A special meeting will be called after this conference by the council, and the proposition acted upon. It is believed that there will be any hitch.

Kooyman Unfortunate.—John Kooyman, the boy who was pardoned from the county jail on Saturday by the state board of pardons, was arrested yesterday afternoon by a deputy sheriff for violating his parole from the industrial school at Ogden and will be taken back to that institution to remain until he is 21 years of age, which means nearly three years. Kooyman was sent to the county jail by Judge Whitaker on Jan. 13 for a term of 120 days for embezzlement. After his pardon on Saturday it was learned that he was released from the industrial school on parole about four years ago. His recent troubles were a violation of his parole hence he was again taken into custody and will probably be taken to Ogden today.

MARCH 21st

1588—Johann Sebastian Bach, greatest musician of the famous family, born at Eisenach, died 1760.

1775—Eugen Bonaparte, second brother of Napoleon I., born in Ajaccio; died 1840.

1804—Publication of the famous "Code Napoleon," the law of France since that date. In the judgment of Napoleon's sharpest critics this code is a monument to his greatness.

On the same day the Duc d'Enghien was shot at Vincennes by Bonaparte's order. Napoleon's warmest admirers do not attempt to excuse this time.

1806—Benito Pablo Juarez, statesman of pure Indian blood, born in Oaxaca, died 1875.

1891—General Joseph E. Johnson died in Washington; born 1847.

1898—Duc de Talleyrand of the noted old French family died in Berlin.

1906—The United States proposed arbitration in the dispute with Venezuela.
