A few succeeded in making their way back to Germany, but the majority perished miserably in the land of their adoution, which offered such go'den promises at first and proved the most heartless of stepmothers. Venezuela's constitution, like those of other Spanish-American countries, looks exceedingly well on paper and sounds sublime in the mouth of an orator: but for actual everyday use-at least, so far as present practice goes-it is a delu-sion and a snare. The alleged repubte is divided into 19 states and the "Dietrito Federal" (federal district), which contains the capital and its seaport. Each state has its own presi dent, its legislative and judicial ad-ministration, and sends to the national congress two senators and one deputy for each 2,200 inhabitants. In the executive department, besides the president are two vice presidents and six ministers, all nominally responsible to the former. The president is supposed to be elected by direct and secret suffrage in all the states, and his term of office is four year-if by rare chance he is not custed by revolutionists, or does not conclude to declare himself dictater and occupy the post indefinitely.
