LOVE FEAST A HEADLINER.

Performing Patriots Led on the Stage
Last Night in a Series of
Diversions.

Reading their ticket with John S. Stanford, whose administration will be remembered because of the organization of the Citizens' Investment company and the establishment of the famous stockade—an institution the police permitted to run until Sheriff Sharp stepped in and wiped it out—the "American" party officeholders got together in a meeting called a convention yesterday and succeeded in having themselves selected again as candidates for another chance to get their hands into the city's treasury box. Those who will run for office are:

Harper Dinniny, for city attorney.
Rudolph Alf, for auditor.
John S. Stanford, for recorder.
Gideon Snyder, for treasurer.

And it all ended with a lovefeast. The officeholders and the office-seekers got together at the theater last night after all but the shouting was over. They congratulated each other that they had taken in line for their old jobs again and renewed pledges to the gods who had made this possible. Dinniny will see that John Dinniny gets a job driving a car for his support in the convention. Gideon Snyder will see that Mary Snyder gets a job in the engineer's office for the same reason. Alf will see that the name of Rudolph Alf is placed on the house, declared that present officeholders need have no fears, because the mayor would take care of them. Rudolph made promises of the same tenor.

ONE DISTRICT IS SURE.

The election of the entire ticket, as far as the Fifth district is concerned, must be conceded, for just before the convention was called to order, Delegate Freed was tendered the services of Kid Bernstein as a party worker. "I'll deliver the goods," said the kid, and Freed thanked him. This will surely be a hard district for the other parties to carry.

It was to give vent to a merry laugh when Reading Clerk McCann began reading the platform. Mustering his full knowledge of Deseret and with the earnestness of a Democrat, he began to read the platform. It was inspiring the spirit he put into the reading of the document drawn and submitted by Sergeant William Nelson. This standing upon their feet, one word after another, he descended from the highest pinnacles of his eloquence, effort and dropped into the sing-song so familiar with court critics. It was a mingling of comedy and pathos that brought down the galleries for a moment of applause.

COME AND GET DONE GOOD.

That platform admits with modesty that Salt Lake never had such fine officeholders as the "Americans." It views with alarm and points with pride as its customary and then promises in a general way, carefully avoiding concrete and particular mention of definite plans to make matters still better. It proclaims a dogma of religious tolerance and bemoans the fact that the capital of Zion failed and promising to see that this is not done again. It slaps the Church on the wrist and then says: "Come with us and we will do you good."

LOVE FEAST THE THING.

But the convention over, the lovefeast was the thing. It was about the best entertainment of its kind that has been seen on the stage of the theater. As a regular attraction it could run to big business. A meritorious number was the appearance of a quartet composed of Edna Dwyer, Mrs. J. H. Taylor, A. J. Kieselberg and J. H. Somers with Miss Irene Kelly as accompanist. The singing of this quartet and the playing of Miss Kelly were enjoyable to the highest degree.

During the evening Ringmaster W. J. Barrett called upon the nominees to mount the stage. Their performances were very diversified. The remarks of Mayor Bradford as reported in the thirty organ read about as follows: "It was a severe blow to me when I was asked to make a speech. (Voice: 'You're all right!') I expect to be humbled the rest of my life. (Applause) I believe I have given you all a fair hearing when you have come down to the mayor's office. (Voice: 'Hurray for Mayor Bradford!') It is true that you have not agreed with me in all things. (Voice: 'Hurray for that!') Mayor Thompson is a big town. (Applause) This is a big town. (Applause) We have enough money to pay all our debts but the big ones. (Voice: 'Hurray!') Some friends asked me to run for this office when I didn't want to. (Laughter) I know you all, but I know most of your faces. (Voice: 'Hurray!') I have not come out here to make a speech. (Another hooray!) I thank you for your attention. (Hurray! cheers from here and there.)

REN RIVES PERFORMS.

The ringmaster then called on Ben Rives to speak a piece. Ben rose with seeming hesitancy and stroked his cheek whiskers gradually while talking for the applause to die down. He said he knew a message of good cheer and then told a funny story about a duck club and in carrying out his metaphor said a gentleman said he didn't want to run on the—and then he got confused and started on another track and said that the convention had done a good job when it nominated him and the rest of the nominees in the afternoon. He told his hearers that he knew how he would feel if he hadn't been nominated, but as ladies were present he did not go further into details. He seemed to feel really sorry for those who were not nominated the night before and the afternoon. He counseled Joe Lippman with the soothing acknowledgment that he is a great "American." He said that in a day or two Lippman would be over his grouches and would be working for the success of the party. Dinniny also administered a dose of Mrs. Winslow's to McMillan in inviting his adherents to come up to the Bransford grounds and meet him and smoke his campaign cigars.

When Dinniny had eventually subsided, the ringmaster called on Sandy Sanford, who had nominated Bransford during the afternoon. Sandy said that he liked a good fight and he liked a good game. He said that when he was in college he was captain of his team and that it won sometimes. He voiced the sentiment of the audience, "He is only on guard." After speaking many other words which brought out cheers from the galleries and Mr. Sanford's friends, he sat down. Hand clapping and heard in the distance and he smiled. The quartet tried to sing "America," and would have succeeded beautifully if the impromptu fife club composed of many strident sopranos, baritone tenors, and nasal basses had permitted. TWO MINISTERS ON THE TICKET

Republican Ward Conventions
Name Rev. F. B. Short and
Rev. Elmer I. Goshen.

SALT LAKE CITY COUNCILMEN

James D. Murdoch Nominated by the
Citizens in the First Is Also
On Roster.

COUNCILMANIC TICKET.

First Ward—J. D. Murdoch, long term; J. G. McAllister short term.
Second Ward—J. A. Eckman, long term; W. O. Vigus, short term.
Third Ward—C. M. Lees, long term; W. J. Yard, short term.
Fourth Ward—F. B. Short, long term; W. T. Atkin, short term.
Fifth Ward—E. I. Goshen, long term; G. B. Proulx, short term.

The above councilmanic ticket was placed in the field by the Republican ward conventions, held in the respective wards of the city last evening. The names of two ministers occur on the ticket, Rev. F. B. Short being nominated in the Fourth ward, and Rev. Elmer I. Goshen receiving the nomination for the long term in the Fifth ward. The only man on the ticket named by any other party for council is James D. Murdoch, who was nominated for the long term from the First ward. Mr. Murdoch received the nomination for the same position by the "Citizens" convention. He is one of the members of the present council from the First.

The delegates met at the Ninth ward hall annex, A. L. Hamlin, precinct chairman, calling the meeting to order. A. B. Roberts was named as secretary and A. L. Hamlin was re-elected chairman for the ensuing two years in this precinct. Claude Y. Russell, Howard Kling and Axel Steels were named for city committee men, but Mr. Steele withdrew and Russell and Kling were named without opposition.

When the nominations for the long term councilmen were called for, the names of James D. Murdoch and George C. Buckle were present. The result of the voting was 30 votes for Mr. Murdoch and 25 for Mr. Buckle. For the short term James G. McAllister, Hyrum A. Silver and William J. Lynch were nominated. Mr. Lynch withdrew and Mr. McAllister received 118 votes against 58 for Mr. Silver.

SECOND WARD.

In the second the convention was

held at the Sixth ward assembly hall. W. A. Latham was chairman of the meeting, and A. B. Cannon was chosen secretary. During the progress of the meeting an address was delivered by J. Greenwald.

For long term councilman John A. Eckman was nominated, he receiving the largest number of votes in the contest with the other nominees. The names of the candidates and the number of votes received by each are as follows: B. G. Raymond, 48 votes; W. E. Vigus, 43 votes; A. H. Eardley, 46 votes; Charles Cuttrel, 44 votes; and John A. Eckman, 78 votes. W. A. Latham and J. Corlies were named as members of the city committee.

THIRD WARD.
Elmer I. Goshen was chairman of the meeting in the third, and Parley Whitcomb secretary. For the long term councilman C. M. Lees and G. H. Backman were placed before the convention. The ballot resulted in the nomination of Lees, who secured 112 votes against 3 for Backman.

W. J. Yard was named for the short term by acclamation and Arthur E. Graham, William T. Edwards and Heber C. Anderson were named as members of the city committee.

FOURTH WARD.
The convention of this ward was held at the residence of H. S. Joseph, at 30 H street. H. P. Myton was chairman of the convention and H. L. Cummings secretary.

For long term councilman, Rev. Francis Burgette Short was named, and for the short term, W. T. Atkin received the nomination.

O. P. Eldredge and Harry S. Joseph were chosen as members of the city committee.

FIFTH WARD.
In the fifth the convention was held in Judge Bowman's courtroom and was presided over by Henry Cobb. Rev. Elmer I. Goshen was chosen for the long term councilman, and Dr. G. B. Proulx for the short term.

For the short term councilman, O. P. Eldredge and Harry S. Joseph were chosen as members of the city committee, and John M. Hays was made chairman of the precinct and W. H. Poland secretary.

GODMAN WILL APPEAL.

Wife-Beating Deputy License Assessor Refuses to Stay Discharged.

The city council meets tonight now that the "American" convention is over to take up some important business on which action has been postponed on account of politics. Sam I. Godman, who was discharged by City Auditor Rudolph Alf as deputy license assessor after he had been arrested for beating his wife, will appeal to the council tonight for reinstatement. It is said. The councilmen will stand with Mr. Alf. It is said, and will confirm the appointment of Frank Kimball to take Godman's place.

The police and prison committee will be required tonight to make a report on Councilman Fernstrom's resolution regarding the chief of police to close the slot machines. The matter of protests of property owners against sewer extensions and sidewalks which the councilmen have attempted to force upon them at exorbitant prices will be considered tonight.
