Indemnities Disputed.

CHICAGO, 13.—Indemnities
against Collector Philip Wad-
sworth and ex-United States District
Attorney J. D. Ward, for alleged
complicity with the whiskey ring,
were today in the hands of the U. S.
District Court at this city. The
only testimony of importance
against them was that of Jacob
Rehm, whom all the juries in the
whiskey trial have discredited,
because he is a confessed re-
venue defrauder and perjurer.

Further Reduction in Passenger
Rates.

The Eastern Trunk Lines an-
nounce a further reduction in pas-
senger rates as follows: Chicago to
New York \$18, to Boston \$14. The
rates to Philadelphia and Balti-
more will probably be reduced in
proportion.

Struck by Lightning.

CLEVELAND, O., 13.—Lightning
this afternoon ignited an oil well
near Bradford, destroying a tank
containing 25,000 barrels of oil, and
several smaller tanks and a num-
ber of buildings. The oil tanks
belonged to McKean & Co., and
Pine Line Co., loss \$125,000.

dan arrived at noon to-day and

Blaine's Gratitude to His Friends.

WASHINGTON, 13.—About eight
o'clock this evening, Blaine called
for paper and pen and ink, and
without a word wrote the following
message to be telegraphed to Con-
gressman Hale at Cincinnati:

"Washington.

"I am entirely convalescent, suf-
fering only from physical weakness.
I express my friends the great
debt of gratitude I feel for the un-
paralleled steadfastness with which
they have adhered to me in my
hour of trial.

"(Signed) 'J. G. BLAINE.'"

The foregoing dispatch was writ-
ten by Blaine at his own sugges-
tion, and in his usual bold and dis-
tinct handwriting, showing no
signs of weakness or hesitation.

Speaker Kerr Improving.

Kerr sat up the greater part of
to-day. The dangerous and critical
features of his troubles are disap-
pearing. He received many con-
gratulatory calls, and had his mail
read to him, and his appetite im-
proved. After dinner he returned
to his bed. His physicians assure
him that by the last of this week

leave the city for a vacation.

Washburne to Blaine.

residence to-day was one by cable
from Washburne, at Paris, reading:
"Your illness grieves me. Are you
better?"
